

Section One

POPULATION

This section presents statistics on growth, geographic distribution and general characteristics of the local population.

The American Samoa 2000 census recorded a total population of 57,291. This represents an increase of 10,518 persons, 22 percent since the last count of 46,773 in 1990. The 2000 census reflected a much lower annual growth rate of 2.0 percent compared to the 3.7 percent between 1980 and 1990.

The American Samoa population is very young. The median age remained at about 21 years; demanding much needed services for early childhood education, health and medical, family advocacy, and employment opportunities. The gender ratio recorded at 104 males for every 100 females.

People moved to other places because of economic reasons, availability of land resources and socio/political stability. Internal movement from Manu'a District to both Eastern and Western Districts in Tutuila continued for many years. On the island of Tutuila, the population shifted from East to West in the past two decades. Western District had 32,435 people, while Eastern District had 23,441 people.

The average number of persons per square kilometers is 286, according to the census count of 2000. Given the ruggedness and steep mountainous landscaping of the main island, the population density could be a lot higher than 286.

Mid-year population estimates are calculated using the Balancing Equation Method. For 2005, the resident population was estimated at 65,500. While both births and deaths statistics are considered fairly complete, the migration component used in the mid-year estimate is an estimate based on the 1990-2000 intercensal residual migration and some indicators of net arrival/departure statistics from Immigration records. The local population is projected to reach about 80,000 in 2010.

While the proportion of the American Samoa born population remained above 50 percent, the trend of foreign-born increased from less than 20 percent in 1960 to over 40 percent in the recent census. The majority of the foreign-born were from neighboring Samoa with over 30 percent followed by the US born with 5 percent. The resident population remained ethnically Samoan with 90 percent and with over 20,000 not a citizen, nor a national of the United States.







VITAL AND HEALTH STATISTICS

This section presents data on births, deaths, life expectancy, marriages, diseases, and patient visits and hospital discharges.

Total births in 2006 (1,442) reported by the LBJ Medical Authority and Health Officials dropped by 278 (16 percent) from the 2005 births. Current births in the territory are now somewhat similar to early 80s' level. This is a significant drop in live births thus the calculated Crude Birth Rate now registered at 22 per thousand persons. Many reasons could have resulted in this record low-births. One reason could be associated to cost i.e., pregnant women were not coming to the hospital to give birth because of increased medical cost and fee hikes. Another reason could be due to much tighter control on immigration policies and flight regulations for pregnant women. Or, that the community is more receptive to and is utilizing family planning programs. Teen births (19 years of age and below) registered at 111 or 8 percent of all births. The proportions of teen births have remained somewhat constant in the past several years but there has been a favorable drop in absolute numbers. I.e., teen births dropped from an all time high of 142 in 2000 to 101 in 2005 and slightly upward to 111 in 2006.

The American Samoa Crude Death Rate remained at 4 per 1,000 persons throughout the years. Infant mortality rate (death under one year of age) dropped went up to 12 per 1,000 live births compared while neonatal and fetal deaths registered at 6.2 and 14.6 per 1,000 live births. Heart disease remained the leading cause of death in the territory followed by Malignant Neoplasm and Diabetes Mellitus.

Population natural growth is defined as total births minus deaths. Assuming both vital registration systems are complete, the natural growth of the resident population in 2006 is at 1,175. It is more than 20 years since this level of natural growth had occurred.

Close to 160,000 outpatient visits were reported by various clinics at LBJ (an average of 440 visits a day.) Outpatient data can be looked at as revenue generation data. If every visit is \$10.00, then the expected fee from visitations to all clinics is estimated at \$1.6 million. If every patient visit spent \$10.00 on medication, another \$1.6 million is generated from medication. If this scenario is true, then the LBJ received revenue of \$3.2 million from Out-patient Visitations. Hospital discharges remained at an average 6,700 with an average length of stay of 3.5 days. Hospital bed occupancy rate registered at 46.4 percent in 2006 compared to 35.4 percent in 2005 and 32.6 percent in 2005.

Marriage licenses processed at the Vital Statistics Office continued to drop (from 202 in 2005 to 171 in 2006.) Life expectancy at birth for males is at 68.5 years versus 76.2 years for females.

Section Three

EDUCATION

This section presents statistical information on school enrollment, education achievement, and institutions.

All those enrolled in all forms of education amounted to 21,200, utilizing 124 educational institutions. Enrollment however, slightly dropped between 2005 and 2006 school years while institutions as a result of additional private schools at Pre-school, K-Programs and Elementary. Total classroom teachers for public schools amounted to 1,011 resulting in a student/teacher ratio of about 16. Student/teacher ratio for the K-5 program is slightly higher than the average by 6 students. With increased enrollment, high school graduates have increased in the past five years.

Enrollment at the American Samoa Community College remained at slightly above 1,600. Continuing students accounted for 58 percent of all students while new students amounted to 35 percent. In the past 5 years Liberal Arts program attracted the majority of students (48 percent of students), followed by Educational and Criminal Justice. Degrees awarded though slightly increased, had remained way below 2001 to 2003 levels.





Section Four

LAW ENFORCEMENT

This section contains statistical data on crime, traffic, accidents, firearm registration, correctional facility population, fire, and court activities.

Reported offenses for the second year in a row had remained at a little over 1,700 compared to an average of above 2,400 from 2002 - 2004. Like the previous year, assault, burglary, and disorderly conduct contributed to the decline in all crimes. Of the Part one offenses, Burglary remained the number one complaint from the local community, followed by Assault and Larceny. Forceable rape cases have doubled in one year. Of the Part Two Offenses, DUI topped the highest number of offenses. This is the first year that a record number of DUI cases were reported (359.) Disorderly conduct had dropped by over 60 percent while Property damage/vandalism is on the rise again. Sex offenses also remained high for the second year in a row, while narcotics have dropped by 50 percent. Juvenile Offenses remained the same between 2005 and 2006. Runaways is the number one offense followed by burglary, disorderly conduct, and assault.

Traffic accidents have dropped significantly in 2006. A total of 680 traffic accidents were reported by DPS resulting in 157 injuries and 2 fatalities. This is a remarkable improvement to reported accidents (almost 40 percent drop compared to 5 years ago.) A total of 169 firearms were registered at DPS. Firearm registration has gone up by 60 percent. Inmate population at the Correctional Facility reported a year-end 2005 count of 222 compared to a 174 count in 2004. About 90 percent of inmates were male and likewise 95 percent were Native Hawaiians or Other Pacific Islands (presumably Samoan) as these racial/ethnic categories were federally standard reporting. No data on Prison Population for 2006 were provided. 105 fires were reported for FY-2006 .

Over 600 cases were filed at the High Court and 428 cases were disposed of, while about 3,971 were pending from the previous year. Criminal cases is on the rise and is still ranked the highest followed by Civil actions and Divorced.





Section Five

CLIMATE

American Samoa has a tropical maritime climate with abundant rain and warm, humid days and nights. Average temperature in 2006 was recorded at 82.1 degrees Fahrenheit. Average temperature throughout the past five years remained at 82.5 degrees. A total of 160 inches of rainfall was also recorded for 2006. The month of February recorded the most rain with about 29.3 inches. The lowest was recorded for the month of June with only 5.1 inches.

Usually, the dry months were June through September and the wet months were November through May. Typically, heavy rain and showers, even long rainy period can occur frequently in any month.



Section Six

LAND USE/REGISTRATION, HOUSING CHARACTERISTICS, AND BUILDING PERMITS

This section presents statistics on land use, land ownership registration and tenure, housing characteristics, building permits, type and value of construction activities.

Total land area in American Samoa consists of 48,767 acres and about two thirds of the land is steeply sloping and virtually inaccessible. In 2006 land registration slightly went up by only 23 acres. This increase is due to both registration of additional individually owned and communally owned land. Approximately 7,700 acres have been registered in five major categories of Land Ownership. Communal or native type of ownership still holds with 26.7 percent, Individually – owned Land at 25.4 percent, 21.5 percent used by Government, 13.2 percent for Freehold, and another 13.2 percent Church owned.

Per 2000 census, American Samoa registered 10,052 housing units. Of the 10,052 units, 93.0 percent were occupied and 7.0 percent (703) were vacant units. Of the 9,349 occupied housing units, 77.2 percent were owner – occupied and 22.8 percent were renter occupied. Tafuna village in the Tualauta county had the highest number of occupants per room on both owner – occupied and renter – occupied units.


Approximately 60 percent of the 10,052 total registered housing units are located in both Maoputasi and Tualauta counties. Furthermore, these counties absorbed most of the growth; a combined 71.6 percent of the rental market (areas where most of the rental units were found.) Housing units are characterized as single detached units, attached units, 2 houses, 3 or more houses, 2 units, 3 or more units, etc. This is unique to American Samoa where about 9 percent of households live in two or more houses. Living in apartment housing is on the rise as 6 percent of households live in buildings with 2 or more units. Those living in single detached houses have dropped from about 90 percent in 1990 to 78 percent in 2000. The construction boom peaked in the 1990 – 1994 period, which accounted for almost 3,000 newly built structures.

Close to 700 building permits were issued in 2006 with only 158 permits issued for new structures. The rest were for extension, repair, alteration or renewal. Estimated value of construction amounted to \$26.5 million.

Section Seven

INTERNATIONAL ARRIVALS AND DEPARTURES

This section presents statistics on arrivals and departures. Data for 2002 – 2004 were either unavailable or partly completed.

The trend in travel industry ever since 9/11 had dropped dramatically. The number of arrivals had dropped from about 89,000 in 2001 to about 64,000 in 2005. Travel in 2006 showed much improvement with 72,800 arrivals. Although all categories of travel showed downward trends, Visit Relatives travelers took a nosedive in the past few years. With tighter immigration controls and strict enforcement of entry permits, those arriving to visit friends and relatives were almost cut in half (from 22,000 in 2001 to 13,000 in 2006.) On the other hand, residents traveling off-island are not coming back (44,000 resident arrivals in 2001 compared to 39,000 arrivals in 2006.) A total of 76,800 left or traveled through American Samoa in 2006, indicating a net loss of about 3,600 persons. This net loss in 2006 was due to more tourists, employment and residents leaving than coming. The same trend was seen in 2005 but with much higher numbers for net residents leaving than the rest of the categories. If the arrival/departure data for 2005 and 2006 were considered complete, then the net loss of the resident population for the two years amounted to 3,600. On the visit relatives/friends category (the major source of migrants), the net gain in the local population (including overstayers) could be as high as 3,200, suggesting a net out-migration of 400 in the last two years (or 200 a year.)

The number of tourists has increased to almost 8,000 in 2006 (a bigger improvement since 9/11.) The United States continued to lead our tourism market with about 52 percent. New Zealand followed with 30 percent and Australia with 9 percent.

Section Eight

ELECTION

This section presents data on voter registration and election results by voting districts, village, age and gender in American Samoa.

A total of 14,283 people registered to vote in the November 7, 2006 General Election. However, only 11,132 (77.9%) of the people cast their vote on Election Day. Tualauta (District #15) had the most votes cast with 1,756 (15.8%). The two districts of Manu'a for the past several elections had the highest turnout followed by Maoputasi District No.10.

Over 44.8 percent of registered voters were between the ages of 18 and 34 with another 25.8 percent between the ages of 35 and 49. The remaining percent were those 50 years and over. A total of 6,399 males (46.6%) registered to vote while 7,621 females (53.4%) registered to vote in the 2006 election.






Section Nine

GOVERNMENT FINANCE

This section presents statistics relating to the American Samoa Government revenue and expenditure.

American Samoa Government adopted GASB Statement No. 34. It is a reporting approach established by Governmental Accounting Standards Board to enforce new requirements and a new reporting model for annual financial reports of state and local governments.

Government expenditure is available up to fiscal year 2005. A total of \$182.0 million was collected, awarded or received by the American Samoa Government, and a total of \$192.5 million was spent resulting in a fiscal year-end 2005 operational deficit of \$10.5 million. This is the second year in a row that the government operated at a deficit despite a surmountable surplus of \$30 million in 2002 and another current surplus of \$27.2 million in 2003 (both these fiscal year end surpluses were due to tobacco settlements and insurance claims received.) Despite the current operating deficits of government operations in the last two years, ASG had accumulated a cumulative surplus of \$25 million since 1989.

In general, government revenues have somewhat dropped in the past five years. In contrast, expenditures have gone up. With the \$192.5 million spent by government, \$65.9 million (34.2 percent) was used up for Education and Culture functions, followed by General Government spending of \$45.6 million (23.7 percent), Health and Recreation (\$32.0 million or 16.6 percent) and Economic Development programs with \$20.1 million (10.4 percent.) This is the first time in the past five years that money spent on economic programs had doubled. Essential services normally provided by government (i.e. education, health and safety) accounted for about \$110 million (57.0 percent of government spending.)

Local revenue collections in fiscal year 2005 amounted to \$63.6 million (a loss of over \$5 million compared to FY 2004.) A drop in taxes, licenses & permits, fines & fees have contributed to this \$5 million drop of local revenue. General Fund account netted a deficit of \$11.6 million (actually higher than the All Funds deficit in FY 2005.) Of all the expenditure functions, Public Works is the only function that is solely dependent on the General Funds.

Section Ten

LABOR FORCE, EMPLOYMENT AND EARNINGS

This section presents statistics on labor force, wages, income, and poverty.

Total employment in 2006 was estimated at 17,395, a slight increase of about 50 workers from the 2005 figure of 17,344. The employment estimate includes 5,894 government workers (including authorities), 4,757 cannery workers and 6,744 employees with the rest of the private sector.

The government workforce has dropped by about 170 due to decline in both General Government and LBJ Medical Authority. On the other hand Cannery employment increased by about 200 while the remainder of the private sector jobs remained the same. Of the 4,494 general government workers, 3,563 were career service employees while 734 were contract workers. The rest were those working in special programs. Census and survey provided more detailed employment information such as industry, occupational, and not in the labor force categories

Local minimum wages for various industries in American Samoa have stayed stagnant since 2002 except for about 5 industry classifications. The highest increase of the five industries was in Tours and Travel with an additional 8 cents hike. Hotel industry and Government followed second with an increase of 7 cents each. Shipping/Transportation-Stevedoring, and maritime shipping agency remained the highest minimum wage of \$4.09. Fish unloading followed with \$3.92 while Fish canning and processing remained at \$3.26 since 2001.

Median household income in 2000 was \$18,219. The lowest median household income was reported for the Manu'a District with only \$14,338 (only 79 percent of territorial median.) The worse is the county of Olosega with only \$10,500 median household income (a little over 50 percent of territorial median.) Close to \$250 million worth of income from all sources were received by all residents of the territory in 2000. Thus, the per capita income was \$4,357.

About 61 percent of all persons or 58 percent of families were below the national poverty level according to the 2000 census. One (1) out of every ten (10) families is a female householder with children. Of the 3,889 grandparents reported to have lived with their grandchildren, 71 percent of them were responsible for childcare.

Section 11

CONSUMER PRICES AND EXPENDITURES

This section presents data on the local Consumer Price Index (CPI), average prices of selected commodities normally purchased by households, and annual household expenditure.

The American Samoa Consumer Price Index is designed to measure price changes of commodities and services normally purchased by the local community. Like the U.S. CPI, it is based on the concept of representative “market basket”; a sample of goods and services the consumer purchased. The local CPI began in 1974. Weight distributions (representing relative value of commodity purchases to total expenditure) are aggregated to obtain CPI Group Indices and Sub-Group Indices. Two major revisions were done on the CPI. The first revision was done in 1982 and the second one in 1997. These revisions were necessary to reflect consumer preferences and market changes. A new household income and expenditure survey was done in 2005. Once finalized, family expenditure from this survey will be used to create a new set of weights for the revision of the consumer price index in 2007.

The current CPI index is registered at 131.0 points: prices of commodities normally purchased by the local community increased by 31 percent since the last revision in 1997 (an annual increase of 3.4 percent.) Simply put, if a loaf of bread cost \$0.60 cents in 1997, it now cost \$0.79 cents in 2007 because of inflation. Inflation rate is calculated at end of every quarter through out the years. Inflations in the past 5 years have remained at 3 to 4 percent except in the later part of 2004 and early part of 2005 where inflations reached 8 to 9 percent. Recently, rate of inflations have come down again to the 3 percent mark. The local economy (which is over 90 percent dependent on foreign and US imports) becomes vulnerable to global changes and international market shifts. Any increase in especially fuel and oil cost will take usually 3 to 6 months before its ripple effects reached our islands. Inflationary analysis can be applied to wage negotiations for the adjustment of fair compensation. Since the last minimum wage increase went into effect for most companies in 2002, it has been 4 years before any increase in wages is put in place to absorb inflationary cost. Therefore, if overall cost of goods and services went up by 25 percent in the 4-year period, the same minimum wage in 2001 e.g. \$3.00 an hour is only worth \$2.25 in 2006.

Comparing average prices of selected commodities through out the last five years, gasoline, electricity and kerosene all doubled (100 percent increase in cost.) Food items such as boneless beef, canned tuna, butter, sugar, salt, cooking oil and sodas increased by up to 50 percent.



Section Twelve

COMMUNICATION AND TRANSPORTATION

This section presents statistics on communication services, registration of motor vehicles, drivers' licenses and permits in force, vessel and cargo movement, air-traffic and aircraft operation.

The number of telephone instrument installed up to 2006 amounted to 10,733; still below the number of phones recorded in 2002 of a little over 14,000. In contrast to landline phones, the use of cellular phones soared to close to 9,000 instruments. The number of overseas called for 2006 was not reported, however, over 19 million revenue minutes were recorded. Telegram service is no longer in use while the number of internet-service subscribers is closed to 2,000.

Vehicle registration reached 9,000 in 2006 (an increase of about 1,100 vehicles.) Private vehicles recorded at 7,700 while government vehicles reached 400. Over 6,000 driver licenses were issued and another 1,480 permits issued for commercial operations, learners' and visitors. Sea borne traffic amounted to 16,500 total movements: 849 vessels arrived to port while 817 vessels left port. Close to 600,000 tons of cargo were handled at the port. Most vessels called into port were fishing vessels bringing in tuna for local canning. However, the number of fishing vessel movements in 2006 have dropped by almost 50 percent.

Slightly over 4,300 flights landed at the Pago Pago International Airport in 2006, carrying 75,501 passengers. Likewise, 4,300 flights took off taking 81,907 passengers (a net loss of about 6,400 travelers.) Since 2003, American Samoa net travel is at negative numbers by three to six thousands a year. Similar trend is seen in travel by route. The PPG – Honolulu route resulted in a net loss of about a 1,000 travelers. The PPG – Apia route had a net loss of over 3,000 travelers. If these statistics on passenger movements are considered persons, then there is definitely an out-migration of the local population to the US mainland or Pacific Islanders are going back to their countries of origin.



Section Thirteen

AGRICULTURE AND FISHING

This section presents statistics on agricultural land, farms, and farm tenures, field crops and livestock, and local fishing.

The 2003 agricultural census (conducted in 2004) was the second census under the new arrangement with the USDA-NASS. Traditionally the agricultural census was conducted as a supplement to the Decennial Census of Population and Housing. A total of 7,094 farms were covered in 2003. Approximately 40 percent of total land area (20,000 acres) is under farming which included cropland, pastureland and other farm uses (including woodland.)

The majority of farms were cropland farms covering over 14,000 acres of land. Most farms were about 1 to 2 acres (38 percent of all farms). Another 26 percent of farms were 1 or less acreage in size. Similar distributions of average farm sizes were seen in the both the 1999 and 1990 censuses. All agricultural and farming (whether for commercial resale or home consumption) was valued at \$58.2 million in 2003: a significant drop from the 1999 agricultural worth of \$73.8 million. The drop in value of agriculture/farming was probably due to flooding which affected American Samoa in 2003, and perhaps due to respondent recall concerns where Hurricane Heta devastated the islands in January 2004.

Stable food (taro, green banana, breadfruits) sold at the Fagatogo Market remained somewhat constant through out the 5-year period. In particular, taro sales have doubled since 2002. Giant taro on the other hand had dropped by over 70 percent.

Local fishing activities in 2006 recorded almost 194,400 pounds of fish caught, utilizing 51 boats and 153 fishermen. Catch volume had improved from the 2005 figure by almost 40 percent. Longlining fishing method although drastically dropped compared to 2002 still brought in the highest catch with over 77 percent.



Section Fourteen
COMMERCE AND TRADE

This section presents data on trade activities, government purchases, and business registration.

The American Samoa Trade Balance in fiscal year 2006 recorded a deficit of about \$141 million. This is due primarily to total value of imports estimated at \$579 million (including the value of raw fish brought in for processing) compared to total exports valued at \$438 million. Government purchases from the US and other countries amounted to \$22 million while value of commercial merchandizing brought in for resale valued at \$342 million. Trade data is still considered incomplete due to the absence of Post Exchange data from import series. The value of export (made up primarily of canned tuna and by-products) in 2006 amounted to \$438.5: a more favorable level consistent with previous years. US Customs also reported American Samoa exports in much more compelling details than are provided here.

The number of canned tuna cases reported by Customs Division slightly dropped again in FY-2006 while value jumped by almost \$80 million. Although a case is a non-standard quantity measure, it provides some measure on unit cost analysis of canned tuna. For instance, the unit cost for a case of canned tuna ranges from about \$17 to \$21 in the last five years. Historically, unit cost of canned tuna had declined.

Total imports brought in through Customs Regulation for commercial use and resale valued at \$341.5 million. The increase in imports from the 2005 figure of \$274.2 was due to an almost \$40 million increase in value of fish for processing. The United States continued to be the leading American Samoa trade partners. New Zealand had bypassed Australia as the second leading trade partner. Thailand and Fiji followed New Zealand with Australia at fifth place. Major improvements are needed at the Customs Office for the collection of trade statistics. Any and all goods crossing the American Samoa boarder should be accounted for regardless of purpose or user. Valuation of goods (FOB and CIF) must be applied. Automation and standard commodity classification of all goods should be adopted. Differentiation between intermediate goods and final consumption goods needed major improvements.

Business License Registration reached almost 3,000 in 2005: a slight increase from license registration in 2004.

Section Fifteen

Electricity and Water

This section presents statistics on electricity production, consumption, sales, number of electric meters and water.

Data for 2006 is not available from source. Total gross kwhs of electricity produced in 2005 amounted to 189 million. About 7.3 million kwhs was used in production, netting 181million kwhs for sale. With percent of line loss at 7.9, only 167.3 million kwhs was sold. Fuel efficiency remained at a little over 15 kwhs per gallon of fuel while lube oil efficiency slightly increased to 1,687 kwhs per gallon. Electricity production steadily increased in the past five years. At the same time, there is quite a significant improvement in reducing line loss.

The average cost of a gallon of fuel in 2005 was \$1.858 compared to \$1.074 in 2001 (an increase of over 80 cents in the five year period.) Up to the end of 2005, fuel cost was at 2.182 per gallon. With the increase in fuel cost the fuel surcharge went up also from about 9 cents in 2001 to 14 cents in 2005. Up to the end of 2005 the fuel surcharge was at about 17 cents.

There were 11,307 electrical meters installed in the territory. Of those, about 9,900 were residential usage (this is close to the 10,000 estimates of housing units in American Samoa from the 2005 household survey.) Another 900 of electric customers were commercial usage while government amounted to about 390 meters. Sales were about equally divided among the four classes of customers with Residential and Commercial Users using 48 million kwhs each, followed by Large Power Users (only 6 of them) consuming another 36 million kwhs. Government and ASPA used up about 34 million kwhs in 2005.

In 2005, total gallons of water sold amounted to 2,241 millions and costing Utility Company about \$1.5 million in production.


