NATIONAL DATA COLLECTION WORKSHOP – IMPACTS OF COVID-19

Impacts on existing Data Collection Strategy & Plans for additional Rapid Assessment Surveys

I. BACKGROUND

Although the Pacific has so far escaped the worse impacts of the COVID-19 virus from a health perspective, restrictions on international travel and both global and domestic lock-downs have caused severe economic disruptions. Unfortunately, there is currently a lack of reliable and timely data on the depth and breadth of the socio-economic impacts of COVID-19 and its consequences in the Pacific. This has generated a lot of interest from Development Partners and Donors around the region, all with the best of intentions in assisting developing economies in particular, with understanding the full impacts of the pandemic to assist in the recovery process. Likewise, National Governments across the Pacific have been actively working to identify the impacts of the COVID-19 crisis in order to provide the best support to its citizens and residents, during this challenging period.

At the forefront of any national assessment work measuring the impacts of COVID-19, whether they be additional rapid assessment data collections or desk studies of existing data sources, should be the National Statistics Offices (NSOs). NSOs have both extensive knowledge of existing data sources currently available and experience in guiding data collections across a wide range of topics, in their respective countries. Having said that, concerns exist that some NSOs in the Pacific region are still not fully aware of the extent of activities currently underway or planned, hampering their ability to engage to the full extent necessary to maximize their unique skills set.

To address this issue, on the 25 and 26 June, under the auspices of the Pacific Community (SPC) and its regularly convened Heads of Planning and Statistics (HOPS) meeting, two short meetings were held bringing together National Statistics Office Heads, Development Partners and Donors from the pacific. The focus of these discussion was two-fold:

- a) Provide information sharing to all participants on what has been taking place and planned with respect to COVID-19 Rapid Assessment Surveys (including the proposed High Frequency Phone Monitoring [HFPM])
- b) Develop further understanding and agreement on best ways to proceed in each country with respect to COVID-19 Rapid Assessment Surveys

Amongst the key issues arising from the deliberations during this 2-day event included:

- a) Whilst coordination to varying degrees was happening across the pacific region to develop strategies to assess the impact and hence response to COVID-19, a lot more could be done at the national level in many countries
- b) For many pacific island countries, National Statistics Offices were not heavily enough engaged in key deliberations surrounding additional rapid assessment surveys countries may wish to partake in to better gauge the impact of COVID-19

To address these two issues, a series of national workshops has been proposed to bring all key national stakeholders together to develop an agreed understanding of the plan forward at the national level with respect to key national data collection activities over the next 18 months, which in turn can guide a regional response.

II. OBJECTIVES OF THE NATIONAL CONSULTATIONS

- 1) Information sharing. Bring everyone up to speed at the national level on:
 - a. Impacts of COVID-19 on existing data collection plans
 - b. Options available for additional COVID-19 surveys
- 2) <u>Develop Way forward</u>. Agree on strategies proposed in taking things forward with respect to:

- a. Modifications to existing survey plans, such as:
 - i. Time delays
 - ii. Changes to field work strategies
- b. Preferred course of action for additional COVID-19 surveys
 - i. Type of survey/s to focus on
 - ii. Data collection approach
 - iii. Preferred timing of fieldwork
 - iv. Strategy for finalizing the survey questionnaires
 - v. Proposed development partner support
 - vi. Potential funding options
- 3) <u>Input to Regional Approach</u>. Provide national inputs in to a regional response which could ensure required technical assistance and funding support was available

(NB: The objectives outlined in "2" may not be all met during the workshop, and involve further consultations, but should be progresses as much as possible)

III. FORMAT OPTIONS FOR THE NATIONAL CONSULTATIONS

The final format of the meeting is to be determined by the country, but some guidelines to develop the approach could include:

- Have the meeting chaired by the chair of the national COVID-19 task force (or equivalent) if one exists
- Have the National Government Statistician as co-chair
- Start by putting everything on the table on what is known about i) impacts on COVID-19 on existing data collections and ii) options available for undertaking additional COVID-19 response assessment surveys
- Devise a preferred approach for moving forward on both data collection activities, and aim to summarize in a workshop template
