STATEMENT

OVERSEAS FISHERY COOPERATION FOUNDATION (OFCF) OF JAPAN

The Overseas Fishery Cooperation Foundation (OFCF) was established in June 1973 as a non-profit organization and conducts its cooperative programmes under the general guidance and with funds contributed by the Japanese Government. OFCF's programmes and activities include:

- 1. Technical cooperation for the development of overseas fisheries including small-scale test fishing and experimental coastal fisheries development, project finding and evaluation, dispatching experts, and receiving overseas participants for training in Japan.
- 2. Promotion of exchange visits of senior fishery personnel between Japan and overseas countries.
- 3. Extending loans to Japanese fishery organizations or Japanese fisheries companies to carry out overseas fishery cooperation projects.
- 4. Recruiting and training Japanese fisheries experts who will participate in technical cooperation.
- 5. Fisheries Development Assistance for Pacific Islands Nations (FDAPIN).

The rest of this report will focus on the following cooperation activities that are in progress in the South Pacific countries: 1) project operations; 2) training programmes; 3) Fisheries Development Assistance for Pacific Island Nations Programme (FDAPIN-Suva office operations); and 4) dispatch of fisheries advisors.

1. Project operations

The OFCF Coastal Fisheries Development projects have been implemented in four island countries.

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2. Training programmes

OFCF commenced its training programmes in 1974. The training programmes were seen to be necessary in view of the requests from various Japanese fishing companies, fishing organizations and related foreign nations. As of March 1992, 915 trainees from 44 different countries have participated in OFCF's training programme. Of a total number of trainees, 231 have come from South Pacific nations per the following breakdown:

2.1 South Pacific Fishery Course

In 1988, OFCF established a specific training programme for the purpose of contributing to the development of coastal fisheries of the South Pacific nations.

2.2 Fishery Leadership Development Course

This year, OFCF has established a new training programme for the purpose of cooperation with coastal nations for fisheries development, to maintain and enhance good cooperative fisheries relations between Japan and those nations.

3. Fisheries Development assistance for Pacific Island nations (FDAPIN-Suva office)

In September 1990, The OFCF Suva Office was established with the full support of the Government of the Republic of Fiji in Suva, Fiji, in order to implement the Fisheries Development Assistance for Pacific Island Nations Programme. The Japanese Resident Representative and two Japanese fisheries advisers are based in Suva, and a foreign fisheries adviser (Mr. B. Onorio, ex-FFA's Multilateral Treaty Manager) was recruited in the Suva Office in April 1992.

By dispatching co-ordinators and engineers and supplying the necessary materials and equipment, the programme is designed to repair and reactivate existing fisheries facilities which has become necessary due to insufficient maintenance, damage caused by natural disasters, etc. The programme is also designed to enhance the working efficiency of the facilities by transferring technologies to counterparts of the recipient nations. The programme serves Kiribati, Solomon Islands, FSM, Tuvalu, Marshall Islands and Palau.

4. Dispatch of fisheries experts

At the request of South Pacific countries or the regional organizations, OFCF dispatches fisheries advisors for the purpose of assisting in the further development of their fisheries industries and strengthening the relations between the South Pacific countries and Japan. Advisors have been dispatched to the following organizations.
