This is the third HIES to be conducted in Kiribati almost 14 years after the second HIES report was published in 2006. The survey was carried out for eleven (11) months starting from May 2019 up to March 2020 on 2,182 households nationally.

The main objective of the survey is to assess the level, structure and trends in the economic well-being of households in Kiribati and to evaluate the impact as well ast he achievement of the Government's social and economic policies such as the Kiribati Development Plan 2016-2020, the Government's Manifestos and KV20 among others. Additionally, the new HIES data will provide updated baselines and will inform and guide the Government's current and future development plans for Kiribati.

The data collected in this HIES will be key in updating information on expenditure and income patterns in I-Kiribati households as well as the National Accounts and the Consumer Price Index (CPI).

Conducting a survey of this complexity had brought significant challenges to the National Statistics Office (NSO). However, the team had successfully overcome these challenges through the great coordination and management of the NSO team together with the assistance and guidance of a Technical Assistant from the Pacific Community (SPC) which I am very grateful for.

My deepest gratitude to all the Kiribati NSO staff as well as the field supervisors andenumerators for this great achievement.

2019 HOUSEHOLD INCOME AND EXPENDITURE SURVEY SUMMARY

Kiribati's 2019–2020 Household Income and Expenditure Survey (HIES) was implemented from May 2019 to March 2020. The HIES was implemented with numerous objectives, including the collection of household (HH) income and expenditure in Kiribati, which is the main focus area of this report.

This report presents information, such as HH income and expenditure, by the following population groups:

- i. *Strata* (or Division): geographic domain for each of the five groups of islands of Kiribati. This allows us to understand the characteristics of HHs in the different Divisions of Kiribati.
- ii. Urban-Rural: geographic domain of areas defined as urban and those defined as rural.
- iii. *Sex of main respondent:* the gender of the 'reference person', or the person identified by the respondent(s) to be the HH head and the person listed first on the HH listing.
- iv. Age of main respondent: the age group from which the 'reference person' belongs to.
- v. *Household with person with disability*. HHs that have at least one HH member with a disability as defined by the Washington Group¹.
- vi. *Household expenditure quintile:* HHs ranked by their per capita consumption expenditure (excl. transfers and intermediate expenditure) and put into five groups with group 1 having the lowest consumption and group 5 having the highest consumption.

This summary provides an overview of the survey sample and a summary of Kiribati's population structure and distribution, and HH expenditure and income. All income and expenditure estimates are reported in Australian Dollars (AUD), unless otherwise specified. Through the application of sampling weights, all reported results are extrapolated to be representative the total population.

HIES Sample

The 2019–2020 HIES was designed to provide statistically significant estimates of HH expenditure in each of the five island groups of Kiribati and the urban area of South Tarawa. Overall response rate was 99.9%. National estimates of total HH income and expenditure are therefore reliable (refer Appendix 1).

A total of 2,182 HHs provided a valid response, which amounts to 11% of all HHs in Kiribati. It is estimated that, at the time of the survey, Kiribati had a population of 19,609 households and 118,480 persons.

The sample and population information, by population groups, is presented in the below table.

Population

From the 2019–2020 HIES, Kiribati is estimated to have 19,609 HHs with a population of 118,480 persons. Average HH size is 6 persons and Kiribati has a sex ratio of 103, meaning that there are 103 males for every 100 females. The median age of the population is 23 and 35 percent of the population is aged less than 15 years old. Kiribati's dependency ratio is estimated to be 64, meaning that for every 100 working-aged persons, there are 64 dependent persons.

The main activity in the past 7 days for the population aged 15 years and older was "Taking care of the HH and family", with 51% of persons reporting this as their main activity. Following this, 20% reported undertaking employment-related activities, 9% reported seeking for work and another 9% were students.

Around 92% of HH participate in agricultural activities, 44% in fisheries, 83% in livestock and 42% in copra/coconut production.

Household expenditure

Total annual HH expenditure in Kiribati is estimated to be AUD 282 million (average of AUD 14,395 million and a median of AUD 11,647). Almost all HH expenditure is consumption expenditure, with a little less than 6% of total HH expenditure being classified as transfers.

In terms of consumption source, 68% is cash based (cash purchased goods and services), 9% is own account production (home production for subsistence purposes), 10% is rents (actual and imputed), 2% is exchange (barter) and 11% is gifts (in-kind receipts).

Consumption expenditure is mainly dedicated to food and non-alcoholic beverages, which accounts for almost 40% of total HH expenditure. Housing and utilities account for 13% of expenditure with "alcohol, kava and tobacco" and "restaurants" accounting for 10% and 9% of total HH expenditure, respectively.

The distribution of HH expenditure is not even and there's a degree of inequality – in terms of total HH expenditure – among different population groups of Kiribati. 52% of total HH expenditure in Kiribati is accounted for by 40% of the population.

Household income

Total annual HH income in Kiribati is estimated to be AUD 328 million (average of AUD 16,704 and a median of AUD 12,007). Three quarters of HH income is cash-based, with 10% coming from gifts, 9% from rents and 7% from the consumption of home production.

Income is mainly sourced from employment-related activities, such as salaries and income from the sale of primary produce. Employment-related activities account for 80% of gross HH income.

The distribution of HH income is not even and there's a degree of inequality – in terms of total HH income – among different population groups of Kiribati. Around 50% of HH income in Kiribati is accounted for by 40% of the population.

SECTION 1: THE 2019–2020 HOUSEHOLD INCOME AND EXPENDITURE SURVEY

The Kiribati 2019–2020 Household Income and Expenditure (HIES) was implemented to collect information on I-Kiribati HHs, people, families, culture, consumption and livelihoods. It is a multi-purpose survey that was designed to collect fundamental baseline data to report on many national and internationally-recognised indicators (e.g., the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs)).

The information collected through the HIES will serve as baseline information to determine the current status against the targets and indicators of the Kiribati Development Plan (2016–2019) and Kiribati 20-year Vision (2016–2036), which will be used to guide policy to ensure the goals of the Kiribati government are achieved.

The information produced from the HIES will be used in the following applications:

- i. Macro economic through the collection of information on income and expenditure of I-Kiribati HH and the types of products they buy, produce and exchange. Further, we collect information on the productive activities of I-Kiribati women and men, so that we can understand their participation in the labour market.
- ii. Micro economic through the collection of detailed information of consumption and expenditure, which allow us to understand the food security and the welfare status of HH in Kiribati.
- iii. Social development through the collection of information across a wide array of themes and sectors, such as gender, education, health, access to improved drinking and sanitary sources, natural disasters, participation in cultural activities and own-account production, and diets and nutrition.

This report is the first official output from the Kiribati 2019–2020 HIES. The objective of the report is to present the main statistical tables on the income and expenditure profile of I-Kiribati HH.

1. Structure of the report

The report provides the 2019–2020 HIES Summary (above), which is designed to present an high-level summary of the income and expenditure profile of I-Kiribati HH. The report provides a brief summary of the 2019–2020 HIES, which is followed by a series of sections that present the results of the 2019–2020 HIES, including:

- Section 2: Population and household profile
- Section 3: Household expenditure
- Section 4: Household income
- Section 5: Additional analysis

In each section, we provide a brief summary of the main results and present some of the patterns of HH income, expenditure, consumption, production, and economic activity. In addition to these chapters, a number of appendices complement the body of the report, including sampling errors and statistical tables.

This report is not the sole output from the HIES as the data have many applications. For example, in the rebasing of the Consumer Price Index and in updating the HH component of gross domestic product. Among others, other outputs will report on food consumption and security, welfare and inequality, and the labour market in Kiribati.

2. Technical documentation

Survey metadata, including a technical note, the questionnaire and the Data Documentation Initiative (DDI), are accessible here: https://microdata.pacificdata.org/index.php/catalog/760.

Analaysis was performed using Stata/SE 15.1. The questionnaire was administered via Computer Assisted Personal Interview (CAPI) using Android tablets and Survey Solutions CAPI software.

3. Survey method summary

The above referred technical documentation is accessible for readers who need more detailed information on the survey method. This section provides a brief overview of the survey method.

Objective

HIES collects a wealth of information on HH expenditure, income, own account production and consumption. HIES also collects information on sectoral and thematic areas, such as gender, education, health, labour, primary activities, transport, information and communication and cash transfers and remittances.

The HIES data will be used to:

- derive expenditure weights for the revision of the Consumer Price Index (CPI);
- supplement the data available for use in compiling official estimates of various components in the System
 of National Accounts; and
- gather information on welfare and food security in Kiribati.

The data will inform indicators under the United Nations Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) and to guide social and economic policy.

HIES method

The HIES was implemented over an 11-month period, from May 2019 to March 2020. The survey was implemented over such a long period to capture seasonal fluctuations in income, expenditure, consumption and production patterns.

The survey scope was all occupied HH in Kiribati.

The sampling approach was two stage stratified sampling. The sample was designed for the reporting of expenditure aggregates by the five groups of islands of Kiribati (South Tarawa – also the urban region of the country, Northern, Central, Southern and Line Islands and Phoenix). The sample was designed based on the results of the previous HIES that was conducted in Kiribati in 2006.

The 2018 HH Listing of Kiribati served as the sampling frame. Enumeration Areas (EAs) were the Primary Sampling Unit (PSU) and they were selected by probability according to size.

The HIES sampling approach was designed to generate reliable results at the following levels:

- *National:* total HH income and expenditure.
- Urban and rural: total HH income and expenditure, by urban and rural areas. South Tarawa being the main urban centre in Kiribati.
- Division (group of islands): total HH income and expenditure, by the five groups of islands in Kiribati.

Fieldwork was carried out by 5 enumeration teams under the management of Kiribati National Statistics Office. The questionnaire was administered via face to face interview with data entry via Computer Assisted Personal Interview (CAPI) using Survey Solutions CAPI software. The questionnaire was divided into 20 main modules and an additional 3 "Other Modules", as follows:

- i. Introduction: Geographic area, household listing
- ii. Module 1: Demographic characteristics
- iii. Module 2: Education
- iv. Module 3: Health
- v. Module 5: Communication
- vi. Module 6: Alcohol and tobacco
- vii. Module 7: Other individual expenses
- viii. Module 8: Labour force
- ix. Module 9: Fisheries and hunting
- x. Module 10: Handicraft and processed food
- xi. Anemia and diabetic test

xii. Food recall

xiii. Food away from home

xiv. Partaker

xv. Non-food recall

xvi. Module 11: Dwelling characteristics

xvii. Module 12: Asset details

xviii. Module 13: Other household items and services

xix. Module 14: Ceremoniesxx. Module 15: Remittancesxxi. Module 16: Food insecurity

xxii. Module 18: Livestock and aquaculture

xxiii. Module 19: Agriculture xxiv. Module 20: Legal services

xxv. Dietary recall

The final response of 2,182 HH sample represents 12.2% of the HH population in Kiribati.

Sampling weights have been generated and all results presented herein are weighted, unless otherwise specified. The probabilistic sampling weights derived from the HIES were adjusted to match the projected population structure by age and sex.

SECTION 2: POPULATION AND HOUSEHOLD PROFILE

In this section we provide a brief profile of the population – the persons and HHs – of Kiribati. We mainly focus on characticstics of the population that are related to income and expenditure. The HIES is not a demographic survey, however it collects interesting information on the economic activities of the population, which are presented below.








In 2019, Kiribati had a population of a little less than 120,000 persons, with around 103 males for every 100 females. Around 53% of I-Kiribati live in South Tarawa – which forms the urban region of Kiribati, with the remainder living in rural areas. Central and Line Islands & Phoenix are the smallest strata by population, each accounting for 7% of the population of Kiribati.


More than one-third of the population of Kiribati is aged 0 to 14, which is indicative of a relatively young population. 6% of the population is aged 60+. The distribution of the population is presented in the below figures.














Figure 1: Distribution of the population by age, sex and strata

The above figure presents the shape of the population distribution in Kiribati which is pyramid-like. This is indicative of a young and quickly growing population. Population from Southern Division was slightly older as can be seen by the shape of the distribution which looks wider in the upper half than other divisions.

Demographic characteristics

The HIES collected information on the demographic characteristics of the population, which are summarised in the below table.

The Sex Ratio – the ratio of males to females – shows us that there are 103 males for every 100 females in Kiribati. Except for Central, across all strata, there are more males than females, with Line Islands & Phoenix having the highest Sex Ration (116 males for every 100 females) with the lowest ratio being in Central where it reaches 98. There are the same number of females as there are males in South Tarawa.

The Dependency Ratio – the ratio of the dependent (persons who are not in the economically active age range; persons aged less than 15 and persons aged 65 years and older) to the economically active population (persons aged 15–64 years). The higher the Dependency Ratio, the more economically inactive people there are per economically active persons. In the case of Kiribati, the national Dependency Ratio is 64, which means that there are 64 economically inactive persons for every 100 economically active persons. When we look at the age and sex structure of the population in Kiribati, it can be seen that around 35% of the population is aged 0 to 14.

The population of Kiribati is almost entirely I-Kiribati, with a few non-local ethnicities residing in all strata, except in Line Islands & Phoenix where the entire population is I-Kiribati.

A little less than two-thirds of the population aged 15 years and older are married (legally and/or custom). The rates are similar across all strata.

The median age in Kiribati is 23 years old. This means that half of the population is aged 23 years or less and the other half is aged 23 or more. Northern's median age of 21 is the lowest in Kiribati and this further supports the higher dependency ratio in Northern division. Southern division has the highest median age of 24 years old.

The average HH size from the 2019–2020 HIES is 6 persons per HH. Geographically, there is not a lot of difference in HH size by Strata, except in the urban region of the country which has a higher ratio of 7.

Education profile (aged 3+)

The HIES collected a wealth of information in relation to education, however the below summary is designed to be relevant to HH income and expenditure. As such, this is not intended to be an in-depth education analysis, it is rather intended to provide indication on education-related HH income and expenditure.

Ever attended school




Figure 2: Percent of the population who ever attended school

Approximately 96% of I-Kiribati aged 3 years and above have ever attended school (Figure 2). Equally, 96% of the urban and rural population has attended school. By division (group of islands, or strata), this ranges from 94% in Southern to 97% in Northern and Central. There is an equal distribution of males and females who have ever attended school. 97% of the population aged 18–59 years attended school, while 95% and 87% of persons aged 3 to 14 years and 60 years and over, respectively, have attended school. 87% of persons with disabilities have ever attended school in comparison to 97% of persons without. By expenditure quintile, school attendance increased correspondingly to expenditure quintile with the lowest quintile having 93% and the highest having 98% of persons ever attended school.

Highest level of schooling attended




Figure 3: Distribution of population by highest level of school attendance

Around 60% of people in Kiribati have attended a highest level of education of lower secondary school (class 1 to 6; Figure 3). More than half of the urban population has attended a grade of more than Primary School, while one-quarter of the rural population has. There is generally an equal distribution of highest level of schooling attended by strata, except in South Tarawa where more people attended upper secondary school. Moreover, a greater proportion of the population without disabilities has attended a higher level of schooling than persons with disabilities. Lower quintile HHs hade lower level of school attendance than higher quintile HHs. For example, 25% of persons in quintile 1 (Q1)had attended at a grade higher than Junior Secondary compared to 47% of persons in quintile 5 (Q5).

Currently attending school




Figure 4: Percent of the population currently attending school

Approximately 36% of I-Kiribati were currently attending school (Figure 4). 35% of the urban and 37% of the rural population were currently attending school. By division, this ranged from 34% in Southern to 38% in Northern division. There was a fairly equal distribution of males and females who were currently attending school. 97% of the population aged 3 to 14 were currently attending school, while almost three-quarters of the population aged 15–17 years were. 11% and 0% of persons aged 18–59 years and 60+, respectively, was currently attending school. The distribution of people with and without disabilities who were currently attending school was similar (respectively 32% and 34%). By expenditure quintile, school attendance decreased as expenditure quintile increased, with the lowest quintile being at 39% and the highest being at 32% of persons currently attending school.

Education-related expenditure




Figure 5: Percentage of the population that paid education-related expenses

Approximately 27% of I-Kiribati paid education-related expenditure (Figure 5). Corresponding to the proportion of the population that attended school, around 62% of persons aged 3 to 14 years incurred education-related expenditure while 67% of persons aged 15 to 17 did.

Received scholarship

Less than 1% of I-Kiribati received a scholarship (Table 7). Persons living in urban areas, in the highest quintile, females and those aged 18–59 years old appeared to be most likely to receive scholarships.

Health

Ongoing chronic health problem

Around 23% of the population reported having a chronic health issue². Around 41% of the population reporting chronic illness took medication to treat their health issue(s). Around 39% of people having a chronic illness was unable to complete their usual activities (e.g., education, work) as a result of their chronic health issue.




Figure 6: Population with chronic health issues

Other health problem




Figure 7: Proportion of the population with other types of health problems

Around 43% of the population reported having another health problem³ (Figure 7). Around 36% of the population reporting another health issue was unable to complete their usual activities (e.g., education, work) while 12% of them incurred a loss of earnings/income.

Health-related expenditure

Approximately 4% of the population incurred health-related expenditure. Urban population were more likely to incur health-related expenditure compared to rural population (respectively 6% and 2%). By strata, Line Islands & Phoenix had the lowest proportion of the population that incurred health expenditure (1% of all people living in this division or 2% or of all persons incurring health expenditure), while South Tarawa had the highest (6%). By sex, men incurred health expenditure more frequently than women, with 5 and 4 percent incurring expenditure respectively. Persons in older age groups more frequently incurred health-related expenditure, with 2% of those aged 0 to 17 years and 6% of those aged 18 years and older incurring health expenditure. By disability status, 7% of persons with disability incurred health-related expenditure compared with 4% of person without disability. In terms of wealth quintile, the higher the quintile, the more frequently health expenditure was incurred with 1% of HHs in the lowest quintile incurring health expenditure compared to 5% of the population in the highest quintile.




Figure 8: Percentage of the population that paid health-related expenses

Functioning challenges (aged 5+)

Applying the Washington Group cut-off point for persons with disabilities⁴, the disability prevalence rate in Kiribati was 7%. All trends tended to be similar throughout all disaggregations except for persons belonging to older age groups. Of the 7,290 persons aged 60 years and above in Kiribati, around a third of them had a disability.




Figure 9: Disability prevalence rates

Population characteristics

Access internet

One-third of I-Kiribati aged 10+ accessed the internet in the last 30 days. More than 40% of the urban population accessed the internet while one-fifth of the rural population did. By strata, only 19% of persons aged 10+ accessed the internet in Line Islands & Phoenix. People without disability were more likely to access the internet compared to people with disability (respectively 33% and 13%). The wealthier the persons were, the more likely they were to access the internet as well. 16% of individuals from the lowest quintile accessed the internet compared to half of the population from Q5.

⁴ The applied cut-off point corresponds to international definition where a person is classified as 'with disability' where the respondent stated they have a 'lot of difficulty' or 'cannot do' in respect to functional challenges in the domains of seeing, hearing, walking, remembering, self-care and communication.




Figure 10: Percentage of the population that accessis the internet

Mobile phone use (age 10+)

Access to a mobile phone to make or receive calls was slightly higher than that of internet. Around 38% of the population used a mobile phone in the last month and the male-female rates are identical at 38%. Across the strata, mobile phone use ranged from 12% in Line Islands & Phoenix to 46% in South Tarawa. The results hence indicate that urban population tended to have more access to cell phones than people living in rural areas, with use rates of 46% and 29% respectively. Almost half of the persons aged 18–59 years used a mobile phone, while 6% of people aged 60 and over did. It is noted that mobile phone use data were not collected for persons aged less than 10 years. There is a strong positive relationship between quintile and mobile phone use where 20% of persons in Q1 accessed a mobile phone in comparison to 54% in Q5.




Figure 11: Mobile phone use (persons aged 10+)

Communication device ownership (age 10+)

National rates of mobile phone, digital tablet and laptop ownership were 27%, 2% and 6% respectively. The below figures show the rates of communication device ownership by the statistical domains we are presenting herein. Across all three assets, there was an apparent trend of higher rates of ownership in urban areas, higher rates of ownership in upper quintiles, higher rates of ownership in the economically active age group, higher rates of ownership by males and higher rates of ownership among persons without disabilities.




Figure 12: Ownership of mobile phone




Figure 13: Ownership of tablet




Figure 14: Ownership of laptop

Alcohol consumption (aged 15+)

Nationally, 4% of the population aged 15+ reported having consumed alcohol (beer, wine or spirits) in Kiribati during the last 7 days. There was a common trend where males, urban population, people without disability or from higher expenditure quintiles were more likely to consume alcohol.




Figure 15: Drink alcohol in the last 7 days

Kava consumption (aged 15+)

Consumption of kava was higher than that of alcohol with a national rate of 16% for people aged 15+. Kava consumption was almost exclusive to males (30% for males against 2% for females). The trends were similar to those from the alcohol consumption with the exception that persons living in rural areas consumed more kava than those living in urban areas.




Figure 16: Drink kava in the last 7 days

Toddy consumption (age 15+)

6% of the population aged 15+ stated they had consumed toddy during the last 7 days. The trends are similar to those from the alcohol consumption.




Figure 17: Drink toddy in the last 7 days

Tobacco use (age 15+)

43% of the population aged 15+ in Kiribati reported having smoked in the last 7 days. Males and people with no disability were more likely to smoke. Around 21% of youths aged 15–17 declared smoking against 45% of those aged 18–59.




Figure 18: Smoke tobacco in the last 7 days

Activity profile (aged 15+)

It should be noted that a separate labour monograph is being produced in conjunction with this report, so this section only intends to provide relevant information on income and expenditure in relation to economic activity. It is not intended to be a labour market analysis.

Overall, "Taking care of the HH and family" was the most prevalent main activity for I-Kiribati throughout all population groups making up to more than half of the population aged 15+ (51%). The trend differed for persons aged 15–17 years old for which the main activity was "Student".

The second highest activity was "Working in another sector (e.g.: government, hotels, NGO...)" which accounted for 20% of the population. It is interesting to note that the higher the quintile, the more people were likely to be part of this category.

The rates of "Job seeking" were fairly similar throughout all disaggregation groups except for people with disability and those aged 60+ years.

More people with a disability or aged 60+ reported being ill as their main activity (respectively 28% and 13% nationally).

The category with the lowest rate was "Working in farming, handicraft and fishing" representing 1% of the national population.




Figure 19: Distribution of main activity in the last 7-days

Main primary activity

57% of those mainly involved in primary activities were fishing or gleaning seafood. People with disability and aged 15–17 years old were exclusively involved in fishing. By strata, 2/3 of the farming activities in Kiribati were undertaken in Southern and Central.

It is interesting to note that handicraft was a male-exclusive activity for I-Kiribati with 'carving' and 'canoe building' being the most popular activities.




Figure 20: Distribution of activity for those primarily involved in agriculture

Fishing and seafood collecting participation (age 5+)

Nationally, 11% of individuals aged 5 years and above in Kiribati were involved in fishing and seafood gathering activities (while not being their main professional activity this needs to be differentiated from the data from Figure 20). While it is evident that rural population's participation was higher than that of urban (respectively 16% and 5%), there were different patterns of fishing participation between the different rural divisions. For instance, 23% of the population aged 5+ was fishing in Central while 8% of them were fishing in Line Islands & Phoenix.

Alternatively, fishing activities were dominant among males and fairly even throughout all expenditure quintiles.




Figure 21: Individuals (aged 5+) participating in fishing and hunting activities

Fishing method (persons aged 5+ who are involved in fishing activities)




Figure 22: Percentage of individuals (aged 5+) involved in fishing by fishing method

Fishing with a net was the most popular fishing methold in Kiribati as per the 2019–2020 HIES data. It was dominant across all disaggregations except for females who favoured gleaning instead. Gleaning was the second most popular fishing method, accounting for 16% of all individuals aged 5+ involved in fishing activities (against 49% for net casting). The "Other" category comprises all the other fishing methods such as spearfishing, trolling, traps, etc. (see Figure 22 below).

Fishing catch composition (persons aged 5+ who are involved in fishing activities)




Figure 23: Composition of fishing catch

Composition of the main fish caught as per the 2019–2020 HIES of Kiribati can be found in Figure 23 below. Reef and lagoon fish accounted for 70% of all fish caught. They were seconded by invertebrates (representing around 19% of all catches). Pelagic and other finfish (e.g., sharks, flying fish) respectively represented the remaining 9% and 3%.

Females were almost exclusively fishing invertebrates (82%) while only 1% of the main catches were pelagic fish. Rural-based population was slightly more fishing invertebrates than people living in South Tarawa (respectively 21% against 12%).

Participation in the production of handicrafts (aged 5+)

Handicraft production concerned 9% of the population aged 5+ in Kiribati (this needs to be differentiated from the main professional activity data from Figure 20). Females and individuals from higher expenditure quintiles were more involved in handicraft activities if compared to other population disaggregations.




Figure 24: Individuals (aged 5+) participating in the production of handicraft

Handicraft products (age 5+)

The main types of handicraft activities that I-Kiribati were involved in were food preparation, other handicraft, weaving and clothes production (respectively representing 65%, 15% and 14% of all types of handicraft production). More than two thirds of individuals involved in handicraft production were preparing food (68% nationally, including 81% in urban areas). There is a trend where people from higher expenditure quintiles as well as from urban areas were more involved in food preparation.




Figure 25: Percentage of individuals (aged 5+) producing handicrafts

In Figure 25 below, "Other handicraft" – which included for instance carving, jewelry, canoe production – had a national rate of 17% with a higher rate for individuals aged 5–14 years (40%). Rural-based individuals were more undertaking weaving activies than those living in South Tarawa (respectively 24% and 3%).

Handcraft purpose (aged 5+)

93% of individuals aged 5+ producing handicraft were selling their products. The trend was fairly even across all disaggregations, except for individuals from lower age groups (5–17 years old) who sold less products compared to older age groups' population.




Figure 26: Distribution of individuals (aged 5+) engaged in handicraft production that are selling their products

2. Household characteristics

Dwelling characteristics

Dwelling tenure

Analysis will now shift from individuals to HHs. "Sex" and "Age groups" disaggregations will concern the head of the HH (person responding to the questionnaire) while "Disability status" will be HHs which has or has not individuals with a disability as per the Washington group definition. It is to be noted that there weren't any HH heads aged 15–17 years in Kiribati as per the 2019–2020 HIES.




Figure 27: Tenure status of the dwelling in which the household resides

Figure 27 below shows that a huge majority of Kiribati dwellings were owned outright (83%). 10% of them were living in a house for free provided by the employer, 6% of them lived in a house provided by church or family for free. HHs that were renting or owning the house with a mortgage represented less than 1% each.

HHs in higher expenditure quintiles, South Tarawa or run by a female head were more likely to be living for free in houses provided by the employer.

Kitchen location

There were different patterns of kitchen locations across all disaggregation groups in Kiribati – especially when compared by strata. Nationally, most kitchens were located in a separate building (41%) and outside (24%).

Households in South Tarawa and from higher expenditure quintiles were more likely to have a kitchen in a separate room. Households in rural areas, and especially in Southern and Line Islands & Phoenix were more likely to have an outdoor kitchen.




Figure 28: Distribution of kitchen location

Main source of lighting

Majority of HHs in South Tarawa were using electricity as their main source of lighting (88%) while HHs in Central were more relying on solar panel electricity instead (49%). Diesel-run private generators were also commonly used in Southern, Central and Northern divisions.




Figure 29: Main source of lighting

Main source of cooking energy

Although electricity was the main source of lighting in Kiribati, most of the HHs were using kerosene as main source of cooking energy. Butane was also widely used in all divisions except in Line Islands & Phoneix and Southern. Wood fire was also commonly used in Line Islands & Phoenix (26%).




Figure 30: Main source of cooking energy

Access to an improved source of drinking water⁵




Figure 31: Percentage of population with access to an improved source of drinking water

80% of HHs in Kiribati accessed an improved drinking water source as per the 2019–2020 HIES. Households located in South Tarawa had more access to improved drinking water sources than rural HHs (respectively 94% and 67%) – especially those in Line Islands & Phoenix and Southern divisions (Figure 31).

Households from higher expenditure quintiles were more likely to drink from an improved water source (Q1: 72% while Q5: 87%).

Access to an improved sanitary facility⁶

Households having access to an improved sanitary facility in Kiribati reached 53% in 2019–2020.

The same patterns as improved water source can be noted throughout all disaggregations: HHs in urban areas had more access to improved sanitary facility compared to rural HHs (respectively 62% and 46%). The difference between the lowest and highest quintiles was even more important (lowest quintile: 44%, highest quintile: 69%).




Figure 32: Percentage of households with access to an improved sanitary facility

Expenditure-related household characteristics

Vehicle ownership

Around 58% of all private HHs in Kiribati owned vehicle (car, van, motorbike, bicycle, cart) with bicycles and motorbikes being the most owned vehicles. 78% of all vehicles present in Kiribati were motorbikes and bicycles. There was also a total of 1,669 cars or pick-ups and 1,286 boats (canoes or motor boats) that are owned by l-Kiribati HHs.

Private travel

Respectively 16% and 4% of HHs reported having undertaken a domestic and international trip in the last 12-months. There were a total of 17,038 domestic trips and 1,026 international trips. It is interesting to see that most domestic trips were undertaken by individuals from HHs located in Northern.

Financial support: proportion of households gifting

65% of private HHs provided financial support in the last 12-months. Out of the 20,000 transfers in total, most of them were done for family events (54%), given to church (17%) or to another HH (16%).

Income-related household characteristics

Remittances received

One third of HHs received cash remittances in Kiribati during the last 12-months prior to the survey.

The highest percentages of remittances received were reached in South Tarawa and in HHs headed by 60+ year-old HH heads (respectively 39% and 47%). Households with at least one person with disability received slightly more remittances (35% againt 33% for HHs with no person with disability).




Figure 33: Percentage of households receiving remittanced in the last 12-months

Remittances origin

The majority of remittances was coming from outside Kiribati – especially in urban HHs (2/3 of remittances). 27% of remittances in Line Islands & Phoenix came from outer islands while 55% of remittances in Central division was originating from South Tarawa. 5,186 HHs received 1 remittance in the last 12-months while 28 HHs (mostly located in South Tarawa) received up to 5 remittances (Table 12).




Figure 34: Origin of remittances

Remittance senders

Most remittance senders were children sending cash to their parents – all the more visible for HH heads aged 60+ (representing 65% of remittances). In comparison with other disaggregation groups, female-headed HHs were the most likely to receive remittances from their spouses/husbands (18%).




Figure 35: Relationship of sender of remittancer to the household head

Livestock and aquaculture participation

More than 80% of HHs in Kiribati were participating in livestock and aquaculture activities. The highest participation rate of 91% was reached in Southern and Line Islands & Phoenix divisions. Conversely, HHs located in South Tarawa, from the highest expenditure quintile and run by females had the lowest participation rates (respectively 75%, 76% and 79%).




Figure 36: Household participation in livestock and aquaculture activities

Animals reared

Pigs were the most reared livestock in Kiribati as per the HIES data. 82% of all private HHs were raising pigs, ranging between 74% in South Tarawa and 91% in Southern division. Households raising chickens were also fairly numerous with a national rate of 17%. Rural HHs, and especially in Northern, Central and Line Islands & Phoenix, were more engaged in such activities than urban HHs. Aquaculture involvement nationally represented around 1% with clams and milkfish being raised.




Figure 37: Percentage of total households rearing livestock

Livestock and aquaculture purpose

Although pigs were largely raised by private HHs, only 7% of them sold their pigs or pig meat. 13% of HHs raising ducks sold their products while none sold their aquaculture products.




Figure 38: Distribution of households selling livestock/aquaculture products

Agriculture participation

Nationally, the percentage of HHs owning a parcel of land to undertake agricultural activities ranged from 11% in Line Islands & Phoenix to 79% in Central. Households having a person with disability participated less in such

activities compared to HHs with no person with disability (respectively 36% and 43%). HHs located in rural areas were also more involved in agriculture (49%).




Figure 39: Household participation in agricultual activities

Agricultural land tenure




Figure 40: Tenure status of agricultural land

Figure 40 below is showing the tenure status of agricultural land. The vast majority of the parcels of land belonged to the household (82%) with the exception of Line Islands & Phoenix division where this rate was at 10%. Instead, Line Islands & Phoenix parcels were used for free (55%).

Only a few parcels were rented for cash throughout Kiribati, with the example of the highest expenditure quintile and South Tarawa (respectively 2% and 1%).

Participation in the production of vegetables

12% of private HHs in Kiribati were harvesting vegetables ranging from 8% in Southern to 21% in Central. Higher expenditure quintiles were more involved in vegetable production than lower quintiles (quintile 1: 8%, quintile 5: 16%).




Figure 41:Household participation in the production of vegetables in the last month

Vegetable products

The most harvested vegetables were pumpkins, other vegetables, spinach and cabbage/lettuce which respectively represented 46%, 28%, 8% and 7% of the vegetables harvested.




Figure 42: Distribution of vegetables harvested in the past month

Vegetable purpose




Figure 43: Distribution of households selling their vegetables harvested

Figure 43 below is showing the distribution of HHs selling their harvested vegetables. The percentages ranged between 6% in Southern and 95% in Line Islands & Phoenix. Households from lower expenditure quintiles were more likely to sell their products than those from higher quintiles (quintiles 1 and 2: 28%, quintiles 4 and 5 average: 21%).

Participation in the production of root crops

8% of HHs were participating in root crop production with different patterns between divisions. 4% of HHs in South Tarawa were harvesting root crops while 12% of HHs did so in rural areas – with high rates in Northern and Central.




Figure 44: Household participation in the production of root crops in the last month

Root crop products

The main root crops harvested were taro and sweet potatoe. Taro were the most harvested root crops throughout all disaggregations except in South Tarawa, Line Islands & Phoenix and the highest expenditure quintile. Line Islands & Phoenix produced instead more sweet potatoes.




Figure 45: Distribution of root crops harvested in the past month

Root crop purpose

The percentages of HHs selling their root crops were lower than those selling their vegetable crops. No HH harvesting root crops in Southern, Line Islands & Phoenix, from the 60+ age group, lowest and highest expenditure quintiles were selling their products.




Figure 46: Distribution of households selling their root crops harvested

Participation in the production of fruit

More than one fourth of HHs in Kiribati were participating in the production of fruit. Looking at the different strata, the rates ranged from 1% in Line Islands & Phoenix to 72% in Central. Rural HHs harvested more fruit than urban ones.




Figure 47: Household participation in the production of fruit in the last month

Fruit products

The main fruit harvested as per the 2019–2020 HIES were coconut, breadfruit and pawpaw with rates reaching respectively 45%, 26% and 12% nationally. Coconut was the most harvested fruit throughout all disaggregation groups except in Line Islands & Phoenix which produced more breadfruit and pandanus fruit instead.




Figure 48: Distribution of fruit harvested in the past month

Fruit purpose

Almost one-third of HHs harvesting fruit were selling their products with the highest rate being in Central (49%) and the lowest in Line Islands & Phoenix (11%). Similarly to vegetables, rural HHs were more likely to sell their crops than urban ones.




Figure 49: Distribution of households selling their fruit harvested

SECTION 3: HOUSEHOLD EXPENDITURE

In this section, we provide a summary of the main components of HH expenditure in Kiribati. The first subsection highlights some of the important facts relating to the distribution of HH expenditure. In the next section, we look at what goods and services are consumed, and their sources. We then provide more details on the main HH expenditure items of food and beverage, housing and utilities, transportation and alcohol, tobacco and kava.

This summary highlights the main elements of HH expenditure and aims to present the main findings of the expenditure component of the HIES. There is a multitude of opportunity for more in-depth analysis and thematic studies, including for national accounts, poverty, consumption and food security purposes, however this is beyond the scope of this report.

1. Total household expenditure

Total annual HH expenditure amounted to AUD 282,280,839 in 2019–2020 while the monthly HH expenditure was AUD 23,523,403 (Table 14). A little more than two-thirds of HH expenditure was cash-based, with another 11% being gifts. Rents (actual rents and imputed rents) and home production represented respectively 10% and 9% of the total household expenditure. Exchange (or barter) accounted for the remaining 2% of total expenditure.




Figure 50: Total monthly household expenditure (million AUD) by population group

2. Average and median household expenditure

National average monthly HH expenditure amounted to around AUD 1,200. This average was higher in urban than rural areas (AUD 1,543 in urban and AUD 909 in rural). To give a better understanding of the expenditure distribution among HHs, the median expenditure – the expenditure of the 50th HH percentile – is provided in this analysis. The monthly median HH expenditure was AUD 971 (AUD 1,329 in urban and AUD 781 in rural).

Urban HHs and HHs with persons with disability had higher average and median expenditure than resepectively rural HHs and HHs without persons with disability.




Figure 51: Average and median monthly household expenditure

3. Composition of household expenditure

Household expenditure is made up of many different categories and types of expenditure.

Expenditure categories are divided into 3: 1) consumption expenditure, 2) non-consumption transfers, 3) non-consumption intermediate expenditure. For the sake of this analysis, expenditure tables will exclude intermediate expenditure (3rd category) but non-consumption transfers are included. The reason for this inclusion is because

non-consumption expenditure transfers is usually a significant component of Pacific Island Countries and Territories (PICTs) HH expenditure. However, this category is not used for Consumer Price Index (CPI) rebasing or for poverty analysis. Non-consumption expenditure is expenditure that the HH incurs while there is no good or service in return for that expenditure (e.g.: donations to church, to another HH).




Figure 52: Composition of household expenditure, by COICOP Divisions 1 to 12 and cash transfers

Moreover, consumption expenditure follows the United Nations Statistical Division's Classification of Individual Consumption According to Purpose (COICOP). This COICOP classification consists of 12 divisions, shown in Figure 52 below.

Finally, expenditure types consist of cash, home production, gifts, exchange (or barter) and imputed rents.

- Cash expenditure refers to expenditure incurred through cash-based transaction where a good/service is acquired.
- Subsistence expenditure is the value of a primary product which is home-produced (e.g.: livestock, crop, fish) for HH consumption.
- Gift expenditure makes reference to a cash-purchased good/service for the beneficiary of another HH
 or the value of a home-produced product that is gifted.
- Exchange (or barter) is the procedure where a HH exchange an item with another item.
- Imputed rents are the value of the services that the owner of the dwelling derives from living in this
 dwelling.

The majority of HH expenditure was on "Food and beverages" (Figure 52) which accounted for 38% of total household expenditure. The next highest expenditure was on "Housing, utilities" and "Alcohol & tobacco", respectively making up to 13% and 10% of total household expenditure. It is interesting to see the differences between different disaggregation groups, in particular between strata. For instance, it is clear that HHs spend less in "Housing, utilities" in Northern than in Central (respectively 10% and 22% of total HH expenditure). Another interesting analysis is when looking at the quintile distribution of expenditure: the wealthier the HHs were, the lower were the expenditure on "Food, beverages" (Quintile 1: 41%, Quintile 5: 34%).

Expenditure source

When looking at the distribution of expenditure by type of expenditure, it seems evident that urban HHs rely more on cash expenditure than rural HHs. To cope with this lack of cash expenditure, rural HHs home produced and exchanged more than urban HHs. The wealthier the HHs were, the more they spent in cash while contrarily, the poorer the HHs were, the more they relied on home production and exchange.





Figure 53: Composition of expenditure, by expenditure source






Figure 54: Percentage of total household expenditure, by COICOP divisions and composition of expenditure source

4. Main expenditure items

Food and non-alcoholic beverages (COICOP division 1 and COICOP group 11.1)

Percentage of households reporting consumption of food

All HHs reported consumption of food and non-alcoholic beverages.

Average and median expenditure on food and non-alcoholic beverages

The avergage monthly HH expenditure on "Food, beverages" and "Catering services" (COICOP division 1 and COICOP group 11.1) was AUD 567 while the median was AUD 464. Urban HHs, wealthier HHs, female-headed HHs, younger headed-households and HHs with no person with disability had higher expenditure on that category.

Looking at Figure 56, rural HHs had higher expenditure on Fish & seafood and Fruit while urban HHs had higher expenditure on Meat and Canteens. Lower quintile HHs spent more on Bread, cereals and Fish, seafood while higher quintile HHs spent more on Restaurants and Meat.




Figure 55: Average and median monthly household expenditure on food and non-alcholic beverages






Figure 56: Composition of household expenditure on food and non-alcoholic beverages, by COICOP Divisions 1 to 12






Figure 57: Composition of household expenditure source, by COICOP division

Housing, water, electricity, gas and other fuels (COICOP division 4)

Percentage of households reporting consumption of housing, water, gas and other fuels All HHs reported consumption of housing, water, gas and other fuels.

Average and median expenditure on housing, water, electricity, gas and other fuels

The average monthly HH expenditure on "Housing, water, electricity, gas and other fuels" (COICOP division 4) was AUD 160 while the median was AUD 140. Urban HHs and HHs from higher expenditure quintiles were more likely to spend more on Housing.




Figure 58: Average and median monthly household expenditure on housing, water and energy

Composition of expenditure on housing, water, electricity, gas and other fuels

Household expenditure composition in Northern and Central divisions were almost exclusively Imputed rents while other divisions' expenditures were more diversified – particularly South Tarawa where HH expenditure on Eletricity and Gas was the highest.




Figure 59: Composition of household expenditure on housing, water and energy, by COICOP Division 4

Transport (COICOP division 7)

Percentage of households reporting consumption of transportation goods and services

Around 80% of HHs reported having consumed transportation goods/services, with 88% in South Tarawa and 74% in rural areas.




Figure 60: Percentage of households reporting expenditure on transportation (COICOP division 7)

Average and median expenditure on transportation

The average monthly HH expenditure on "Transportation" (COICOP division 7) was AUD 70 while the median was AUD 46. Urban HHs and HHs from higher expenditure quintiles were more likely to spend more on transportation. The difference between the fourth and fifth expenditure quintiles is even more significant for transportation than it is for COICOP division 4 (Housing, utilities).




Figure 61: Average and median monthly household expenditure on transportation (COICOP division 7)

Composition of expenditure on transportation




Figure 62: Composition of household expenditure on transportation (COICOP Division 7)

Multiple different expenditure patterns erupt from Figure 62. Proportion of expenditure on Cars or Road transportation was almost zero—in Central and Southern divisions while expenditure on Motorcycles and Sea

transportation was higher there than in any other strata. Expenditure on Cars was higher in higher quintiles while expenditure on Road transportation, Sea transportation and Motorcycles was higher for HHs from lower quintiles.




Figure 63: Percentage of households reporting expenditure on alcohol, tobacco, kava and betel nut (COICOP division 2)

Average and median expenditure on alcohol, tobacco and kava

The average monthly HH expenditure on COICOP division 2 was AUD 119 while the median was AUD 83. Once again, urban HHs were more likely to spend more on alcohol, tobacco and other narcotics. It seems clear that wealthier HHs consume more of these products than HHs from lower quintiles.




Figure 64: Average and median monthly household expenditure on alcohol, tobacco, kava and betel nut (COICOP Division 2)

Composition of expenditure on alcohol, tobacco and kava

The patterns are fairly similar throughout all disaggregation groups with a few exceptions nevertheless. Female-headed HHs consumed more Beer and Wine but less Kava than male-headed HHs. Urban HHs and those from higher expenditure quintiles spent more on Beer than rural HHs and HHs from lower quintiles.




Figure 65: Composition of household expenditure on alcohol, tobacco, kava and betel nut (COICOP Division 2)

SECTION 4: HOUSEHOLD INCOME

In this section, we provide a summary of the main components of HH income in Kiribati. The first subsection highlights some of the important facts relating to the distribution of HH income. The next section we look at income sources. We then provide more detail on the main HH income sources of employee benefits and primary industry.

This summary highlights the main elements of HH income and aims to present the main findings of the income component of the HIES. There is a multitude of opportunity for more in-depth analysis and thematic studies, including for national accounts, labour market and poverty, however this is beyond the scope of this report.

The income aggregates reported herein are all net of intermediate expenditure, however intermediate expenditure is collected in HIES and it hence worth reporting. Intermediate expenditure are all expenditures associated with any production activity of the HH (HHs purchasing pig food for raising and selling their pigs for instance). More information on intermediate expenditure can be found in Section 5.

1. Total household income

As per the 2019–2020 HIES, the total annual houseold income was AUD 327,552,087 – which makes a total monthly HH income of AUD 27,296,007. Three-quarters of HH income were sourcing from Cash, 10% from Gifts, 9% from Imputed rents while 7% came from Home production. The intermediate expenditure, which were subtracted from the total HH income, accounted for more than a million Australian dollars (around -4%). Exchange and In-kind income respectively represented 2% and 1% of the total income.




Figure 66: Total monthly household income (million AUD) by population group

2. Average and median income

National average monthly HH income amounted to around AUD 1,392. This average was higher in urban than rural areas (AUD 1,706 in urban and AUD 1,126 in rural). To give a better understanding of the income distribution among HHs, the median income – the income of the 50th HH percentile – is provided in this analysis. The monthly median HH income was AUD 1,001 (AUD 1,248 in urban and AUD 864 in rural).

Urban HHs, female-headed HHs, younger-headed HHs and HHs with persons with disability had higher average and median income than resepectively rural HHs, male-headed HHs, older-headed HHs and HHs without persons with disability.

The strata that reported the lowest average and median HH income were Northern (respectively AUD 1,007 and AUD 728) and Southern (respectively AUD 1,053 and AUD 822) divisions while the highest average / median income were accounted in South Tarawa (average: AUD 1,706; median: AUD 1,248).




Figure 67: Average and median monthly household income (in AUD)

3. Composition of household income

As expenditure, the main consideration to the categorisation of different HH income sources was to present the data in a logical and easily interpretable structure. For this sake, income analysis follows the Pacific Classification of Income (PACCOI) for classifying HH income.

Income categories are broadly made up of 5 PACCOI divisions: 1) Employment income; 2) Property income; 3) Transfer income; 4) Gifts & remittances income; 5) Imputed rents. A description of these income categories can be found below.

- 1. Employment income consists of employee-related income (e.g., wages, salaries, bonuses, overtime and in-kind employee income such as housing allowance, electricity, food and clothing).
- 2. Property income relates to the generation of income from assets owned by the HH, which are categorised as home rental (receiving rent from dwellings that the HH owns) or land lease (receiving payments for the use of a piece of land that the HH owns) and other general capital income (interest on deposits or loans, dividend).
- 3. Transfer income refers to receipts through social security, pension, superannuation or provident funds, child support (alimony), grants or scholarships, insurance claims and other.
- 4. Gifts and remittances refers to the receipt of cash gifts from domestic or foreign HHs and the receipt of items being home-produced.
- 5. Imputed rents have already been defined in Section 3 on HH Expenditure.

Income types have already been covered in Section 3 on HH Expenditure with the exception of the "In-kind from employer" income type which is any good or service acquired in exchange for employee-related services.

Income category

As previously stated, Employment income accounted for 80% of HH income in Kiribati, which ranged from 71% to 85% of total household income in Central and Line Islands & Phoenix divisions respectively. All other income categories were harmonised throughout all disaggregation groups with the exception of Imputed rents in Central which accounted for 15% compared to 7% of total household income in South Tarawa for instance.

When looking at PACCOI group income distribution (Figure 69), income from Employee benefits was the most important, then followed by Primary industry. Income from Employee benefits ranged between 23% in Central to 61% in South Tarawa. The share of income from Employee benefits was higher in Female-headed HHs and in HHs from higher quintiles.

Income from Primary industry was higher in rural areas – especially in Line Islands & Phoenix and Central divisions – and in male-headed HHs.

Income from Imputed rents were ranging from 7% of the total HH income in South Tarawa, Northern and Line Islands & Phoenix to 15% in Central.




Figure 68: Composition of household expenditure, by PACCOI Division




Figure 69: Composition of household expenditure, by PACCOI Group




Figure 70: Percentage of total household income, by PACCOI Group and income source

Employee benefits

Percentage of households reporting income from employee benefits




Figure 71: Percentage of household receiving income from employee benefits

Figure 71 shows that two-thirds of Kiribati HHs reported having received income from employee benefits (PACCOI group 11) including 85% in South Tarawa and 52% in rural areas.

Average and median income from employee benefits

The average monthly HH income from employee benefits was AUD 1,043 while the median one was AUD 661. Once again, urban HHs were more likely to have higher average and median employee benefit income. Femaleheaded HHs had also higher income from such source.




Figure 72: Average monthly household income from employee benefits

Composition of employee benefit income

The vast majority of employee benefit income came from Cash wages (95% nationally) than from Cash wages from secondary activity (3%). Housing allowance employee benefits was slightly higher in Central division while almost non-existant in Southern (less than 1%).




Figure 73: Composition of household income from employee benefits, by PACCOI

Primary activities

Percentage of households reporting income from primary activities

Around 95% of HHs in Kiribati reported receiving income from primary activities (PACCOI group 13) ranging from 92% in South Tarawa to 100% in both Central and Southern divisions. HHs from higher quintiles were slightly less numerous than those from lower quintiles to receive income from agriculture, livestock, fishing and/or handicraft activities.




Figure 74: Percentage of household receiving income from primary activities

Average and median income from primary activities

The average monthly HH income from primary activities was AUD 486 while the median was AUD 300. Contrarily to employee benefits, rural HHs (especially in divisions like Line Islands & Phoenix and Central) were more likely to have higher average and median income from primary activities.




Figure 75: Average monthly household income from primary activities

Composition of primary activities income

Nationally, agricultural home production, Cash handicraft and Cash agriculture were the highest primary activity income sources representing around three-quarters of that income category (respectively 26%, 25% and 23%). Home production livestock and Cash livestock were the two lowest share of the primary activity income. In South Tarawa, income from cash agriculture was almost non-existant while cash from handicraft reached 44%.




Figure 76: Composition of household income from primary activities, by PACCOI

Source of primary activity income

60% of national primary activity income was originating from cash transactions while home production represented more than 20%. Exchange income was low in South Tarawa though fairly important in Southern division (17%). Gifts were higher in South Tarawa, highest quintile HHs and in female-headed HHs than in other disaggregation group.




Figure 77: Source of primary income

SECTION 5: ADDITIONAL ANALYSES

In this section, we compare the results of the 2019 HIES with those from the 2006 HIES. Following this, we examine imputed rents, intermediate expenditure and population distribution by expenditure quintile.

Comparison with previous HIES

After the first HIES in 2006, Kiribati National Statistics Office undertook a second HIES 13 years later. A 13-year-long period can give rise to significant changes in expenditure and income and due to this (as well as methodological differences in the conduct of HIES) their comparison should be treated with caution. We also note that we were not able to obtain the CPI for the period from 2006 to 2019/20, which means the table below is not CPI adjusted.

Between 2006 and 2019, the average monthly HH expenditure increased by more than 50% while the average monthly HH income underwent a significant change of 91%. The most significant differences occurred in Southern division for both expenditure and income.

Imputed rents

Nationally, imputed rents (both Actual and Imputed rents) were estimated to be around AUD 119 per month per HH. Central division imputed rents (AUD 217) were higher than in any other strata while those from Northern were the lowest (AUD 74).




Figure 78: Average monthly estimates of imputed rents, by population group (in millions AUD)

Intermediate expenditure

Percentage of households reporting intermediate expenditure

Intermediate expenditure was incurred by more than half of all private HHs in Kiribati, with a higher percentage in South Tarawa and by households in higher expenditure quintiles.




Figure 79: Percentage of households reporting incurring intermediate expenditure

Composition of intermediate expenditure

Non-consumption intermediate expenditure were the most important share of the intermediate expenditure. Non-consumption intermediate expenditures are all expenditures associated with any activity production of the HH like handicraft, fishing, livestock, farming-related expenditures. They represented 58% of all intermediate expenditures, while vehicle purchase and other major recreation durables accounted for respectively 38% and 3% nationally. HHs from higher quintiles or with no person with disability incurred more intermediate expenditure on vehicle purchase.




Figure 80: Composition of intermediate expenditure, by COICOP Group

Population by quintile

A quintile represents one-fifth of the population (HHs) grouped by their total expenditure. Quintile 1 (Q1) represents 20% of the HHs with the lowest expenditure, while quintile 5 (Q5) represents 20% of the HHs with the highest expenditure.

Nationally, the distribution of expenditure quintiles is even as they were constructed at a national level. But when looking at this distribution by strata, it is clear that wealthier HHs from Q5 were more likely to be found in South

Tarawa (26%) than in Southern division for instance (10%). A high proportion of HHs (33%) from Northern division were in Q1.




Figure 81: Distribution of population by national expenditure quintile

The standard distribution for expenditure and income by quintiles should be a lower value in Q1 than in Q2, and lower in Q2 than in Q3 and so on. This is the case in all disaggregation groups except in Southern division where Q4 average monthly household expenditure/income was slightly higher than that of Q5. This can be explained in Figure 81 above, which showed that HHs from lower quintiles were more numerous than those from higher quintiles in this division.




Figure 82: Average monthly household expenditure, by national expenditure quintile (in AUD)

Average monthly household income by expenditure quintile




Figure 83: Average monthly household income, by national expenditure quintile (in AUD)

Income inequality

Lorenz curve and Gini coefficient are used to measure income or expenditure inequality. The Gini coefficient measures the inequality of a distribution among the values of a variable; the higher the value, the more inequal the distribution is. A Gini coefficient of 0 illustrates perfect income equality while a ratio of 1 corresponds to a perfect inequality of income. The Gini coefficient is often defined mathematically based on the Lorenz curve which graphically represents the proportion of total income that is cumulatively earned by x% of the total population.




Figure 84: Lorenz curve

Lorenz curve in Figure 84 shows that the bottom 20% of the population accounted for around 7% of total income while the bottom 50% of the population accounted for around 25% of total income. 80% of the total population accounted for 55% of total income (or, in other word, 20% of the population accounted for 45% of total household income).

Table 18 below illustrates the Gini coefficient for each of the disaggregation groups that were used throughout this report. The Gini coefficient is fairly similar throughout all groups with a few exceptions at the expenditure quintile level.

APPENDIX 1: SAMPLING ERRORS

The tables in this section present the Relative Sampling Errors (RSEs) for the income and expenditure aggregates. It is beyond the scope of this report to present sampling errors at a finer level of disaggregation, however it should be noted that there is an increased degree of error with finer levels of disaggregation, especially where income and expenditure categories have few transactions and the sample is relatively small.

As a general guide, the below thresholds can be used to help with interpretation of the RSEs and to guide the robustness of each aggregated income and expenditure estimate.

1. Relative sampling errors for expenditure aggregates

Table 19 presents the RSEs for the total expenditure aggregates, by COICOP Division and geographical division. According to the data quality thresholds presented above, it can be seen that total RSE is 2.9% (i.e., national HH expenditure estimates are very reliable). Disaggregated by group of islands (division or strata), average annual HH expenditure estimates have a range of 2.3 to 4.6% making the strata disaggregated HH expenditure estimates reliable.

Looking at the RSEs of HH expenditure by COICOP Division, it can be seen that the estimates are reasonably reliable at a national level, however when disaggregated by geographical division, they become less reliable. RSEs of expenditure in commonly consumed items, such as those that fall into the categories of 'Food and non-alcoholic beverages', 'Water, housing, electricity and gas', 'Alcoholic beverages, Tobacco and 'Communication' are reasonable across all strata. RSEs of expenditure for items that are not consumed by all HHs, such as 'Health', 'Intermediate expenditure', and 'Cash transfers', are higher and the estimates should therefore be used with caution given the potential for being inaccurate.

Tables 20 and 21 present the RSEs for expenditure aggregates by COICOP Group and COICOP Class and strata. It can be seen that national estimates by COICOP Group and COICOP Class are fairly reliable, however the potential for error greatly increases as expenditure estimates are disaggregated by COICOP. Geographical expenditure estimates by COICOP Group and Class (and hence Sub-class and COICOP) should generally be treated with caution given the RSE increase the more we disaggregate the estimates.

2. Relative sampling errors for income aggregates

Table 22 presents the RSEs for the total income aggregates, by PACCOI Division and geographical division (strata). According to the data quality thresholds presented above, it can be seen that total RSE is 2.6% (i.e., national HH income estimates are very reliable). Disaggregated by strata, average annual HH income estimates have a range of 4.1 to 5.5% making the strata disaggregated total HH income estimates being reasonably reliable.

Looking at the RSEs of HH income by PACCOI Division, it can be seen that the estimates are reasonable reliable at a national level, ranging from 1.9 to 17.5% however when disaggregated by strata, they become less reliable. RSEs for common income items, such as those that fall into the categories of 'Employment income', 'Gifts and remittances', and 'Imputed rents' are reasonable across all strata. RSEs of income for items that are not common income sources, such as 'Property', 'Transfer' and 'Intermediate expenditure', are higher and the estimates should therefore be used with caution given the potential for being inaccurate.

Tables 23 and 24 present the RSEs for income aggregates by PACCOI Group and PACCOI Class. It can be seen that national estimates by PACCOI Group and PACCOI Class are reliable in most cases, however the potential for error greatly increases as income estimates are disaggregated by PACCOI and strata. Geographical expenditure estimates by PACCOI Group and Class should generally be treated with caution given the RSE increase the more we disaggregate the estimates.
