





# Rapid Assessment Surveys and COVID-19 Socio-Economic Impact Assessments in the Pacific

### **Information Sharing and Planning**

## **CONCEPT NOTE**

#### **Background**

Although the Pacific has so far escaped the worse impacts of the COVID-19 virus from a health perspective, restrictions on international travel and both global and domestic lock-downs have caused severe economic disruptions. Unfortunately there is currently a lack of reliable and timely data on the depth and breadth of the socio-economic impacts of COVID-19 and its consequences in the Pacific. This has generated a lot of interest from Development Partners and Donors around the region, all with the best of intentions in assisting developing economies in particular, with understanding the full impacts of the pandemic to assist in the recovery process. Likewise, National Governments across the Pacific have been actively working to identify the impacts of the COVID-19 crisis in order to provide the best support to its citizens and residents, during this challenging period.

At the forefront of any national assessment work measuring the impacts of COVID-19, whether they be additional rapid assessment data collections or desk studies of existing data sources, should be the National Statistics Offices (NSOs). NSOs have both extensive knowledge of existing data sources currently available and experience in guiding data collections across a wide range of topics, in their respective countries. Having said that, concerns exist that some NSOs in the Pacific region are still not fully aware of the extent of activities currently underway or planned, hampering their ability to engage to the full extent necessary to maximize their unique skills set.

The purpose of this meeting is to provide an opportunity for NSO heads (and senior NSO staff) to better understand what is happening across the region, both in other countries as well as activities driven by development partners, so they are aware what options are available to them to address the demands of data assessment needs.

The meeting will also provide an opportunity for development partners and donors alike, to demonstrate that a coordinated effort is paramount in their minds, to provide the necessary support to NSOs in undertaking COVID-19 response activities from a data needs perspective.

#### **Objectives**

- 1) Information sharing: The first key aspect of the meeting will be to provide information sharing to all participants on what has been taking place and planned with respect to Rapid Assessment Surveys (including the proposed High Frequency Phone Monitoring [HFPM] surveys, see Annex 2 for the HFPM Concept Note and the draft questionnaire) and COVID-19 Socio-Economic Impact Assessments, as follows:
  - a. NSOs learn from other NSOs what is taking place in each of their countries
  - b. Partners and Donors learn from NSOs on what is taking place in countries
  - c. NSOs learn from Partners on what plans have been developed or planned for PICTs with respect to COVID-19 surveys/assessments
- 2) Way forward: The second key aspect of the meeting will be to get further understanding and agreement on best ways to proceed in each country with respect to Rapid Assessment Surveys and COVID-19 Socio-Economic Impact Assessments, as follows:
  - a. Through an open plenary, NSOs share their views on what they feel works best for them given the current situation of progress and planned activities
  - b. Partners share their views in response to NSO feedback
- 3) Finalize a plan for key next steps to address the common understanding on "ways forward" within each country

Conduct the meeting over two days as follows:

- Day 1 (Phase 1): Information sharing (1-4 in draft Agenda below) (Approx 2 hrs duration)
- Day 2 (Phase 2): Planning a way forward (5-6 in draft Agenda below) (Approx 1.5 hrs duration)

#### **Meeting Conduct**

Recognising the importance of coordination and cooperation the meeting is being jointly convened between SPC, the World Bank and UN agencies in the region, and with NSOs.
