Summary/short description/key points:

- 1. The Fifth Regional Technical Meeting on Coastal Fisheries and Aquaculture (RTMCFA5), including the Second Community-Based Fisheries Dialogue (CBFD2), was held from 11-14 October 2022. The meeting and the dialogue were hosted using a hybrid format, with participants joining either in-person or online.
- 2. The purpose of the RTMCFA5 was to bring together coastal fisheries and aquaculture scientists and technical experts in the Pacific to discuss important technical and scientific gaps, needs, challenges and opportunities.
- 3. The purpose of the CBFD2 was to give the civil society organisations (CSOs) and other non-state actors (NSAs) community an opportunity to share experiences and lessons-learned on community-based fisheries initiatives, and to provide information and advice on key needs and issues, through the RTMCFA to the Heads of Fisheries, to assist with informing Ministers and Pacific Leaders on priority issues associated with the sustainable use of coastal fisheries resources.
- 4. The full outcomes of the RTMCFA5 and CBFD2 are provided in Background Papers [2a] and [2b], respectively. The participants of both meetings were asked to identify, discuss and agree on clear priority issues to be transmitted to the HoF15 for consideration. This Working Paper presents those key recommendations from the RTMCFA5 and the CBFD2.

Reports from the Fifth Regional Technical Meeting on Coastal Fisheries and Aquaculture (RTMCFA5) and from the Second Community-Based Fisheries Dialogue (CBFD2)

Introduction

- The Fifth Regional Technical Meeting on Coastal Fisheries and Aquaculture (RTMCFA5) was held as a hybrid meeting with participation both in-person and online using a virtual platform, from 11-14 October 2022, and was chaired by Mr. Monte Depaune, Coastal Fisheries Manager, Nauru Fisheries and Marine Resources Authority.
- 2. The RTMCFA5 brought together coastal fisheries and aquaculture scientists, officers and technical experts in the Pacific to discuss important technical and scientific gaps, needs, challenges and opportunities. 13 SPC member countries and territories participated in-person, with 7 countries and territories participating remotely via the Zoom platform. Over 130 participants (47 in-person and at least 76 online) attended from members, observers, civil society organisations (CSOs), non-government organisations (NGOs) and other non-state actors (NSAs).
- 3. The hybrid format of the meeting required a more focused discussion on a limited number of high priority technical issues with more in-depth discussions in breakout group sessions.
- 4. The Second Community-Based Fisheries Dialogue (CBFD2) was held in association with the RTMCFA5 on 13 October 2022. The CBFD2 was chaired by an independent Convenor, Mr Afelee Pita from Tuvalu. At least 24 (11 in-person and at least 13 online) representatives of CSO and other NSA groups actively engaged in plenary and breakout group discussions. SPC members and partners participated as observers.
- 5. The CBFD is convened by and focused on CSOs and other NSAs, with SPC FAME as the secretariat. The purpose of the CBFD is to give the CSO and other NSA community an opportunity to provide information and advice on key needs and issues, through the RTMCFA to the Heads of Fisheries, to assist with informing Ministers and Pacific Leaders on priority issues associated with the sustainable use of coastal fisheries resources.
- 6. The CBFD also provides an opportunity to share experiences and lessons from community-based initiatives to strengthen efforts to maintain productive and healthy ecosystems and their associated fisheries resources that are critical to the wellbeing of coastal communities.

Report to HoF15 on the Outcomes and Actions from the RTMCFA5

- 7. The overarching theme of RTMCFA5 focused on the main technical issues affecting coastal fisheries and aquaculture in support of better evidence-based resource management, equitable access to resources and enhanced sustainable development of aquaculture and coastal fisheries.
- 8. The meeting included plenary and breakout group technical sessions on:
 - a. Changing behaviour in coastal fisheries and aquaculture through MCS.

- b. What science is needed for trade in CITES listed sea cucumber species.
- c. Developing the Regional Aquaculture Strategy from Assessment to Strategy.
- d. Implementation of the Regional framework on aquatic biosecurity and National Aquatic Biosecurity Plans.
- e. Coastal fisheries and aquaculture: What tools? When to use them? How to get training and support?
- 9. The RTMCFA5 Outcomes and Actions Report (see Background Paper 2a), along with all the working and information papers and the presentations, are available on the SPC RTMCFA5 website (English: https://fame1.spc.int/en/meetings/261 and French: https://fame1.spc.int/fr/meetings/261).
- 10. The **RTMCFA5 Outcomes and Actions Report** includes the agreed priority issues and needs to be actioned by SPC members, provides guidance to SPC FAME's Coastal Fisheries and Aquaculture Programme (CFAP), and identifies the key recommendations to be taken to the 15th Heads of Fisheries (HoF15) meeting in 2023.

 - The purpose of the CBFD and an overview of the focus of the CBFD2.
 - Establishment of the interim Community-Based Fisheries Dialogue Advisory Group (CBFD-AG).
 - Identification and prioritisation of CBF issues of importance or interest that are common across the region or sub-regions.

- b. Hearing the Voices: Community-Based Fisheries Priorities.
 - What are the needs of CSO/NSA representation for transparent national processes for selecting participants for CBFD and other national level dialogues on coastal fisheries?

 - How can traditional/local knowledge be better integrated with modern/ conventional science for effective CBFM?
