







## Technical Workshop on International Merchandise Trade Statistics

Focusing on goods traded under preferential trade agreements 26 February to 2 March 2018 at PIFS, Suva, Fiji

### **OUTCOMES DOCUMENT**

- The Pacific Community (SPC), in partnership with the Pacific Islands Forum Secretariat (PIFS), the
  Oceania Customs Organisation (OCO), and the Melanesian Spearhead Group Secretariat (MSG),
  conducted a technical workshop on International Merchandise Trade Statistics (IMTS) focusing
  on goods traded under the Preferential Trade Agreements (PTA), from 26 February to 2 March
  2018 at the PIFS' Main Conference Centre in Suva. Agenda is attached as Appendix 1.
- 2. Trade officials, private sector organisations, trade compilers, customs officials, development partners and resource persons attended the workshop. Senior representatives of MSG, PIFS, OCO and SPC delivered statements during the opening session. A list of participants is attached as Appendix 2.

## **Background**

3. In 2012, SPC held a Workshop in Noumea which was attended by the Pacific Island Countries and Territories (PICTs) and partners. At that workshop, a set of Tables on IMTS was endorsed for completion by all PICTs. One of the Table's relates to "Trade by Trade Agreements". This Table has sub-components e.g. Trade under MSG. Until August 2016, none of the MSG countries completed this table. In August 2016 MSG Secretariat had a staff attached to SPC to work with SPC's Pacific Regional Information System Management (PRISM) staff to be able to compile data on goods traded under the MSG Agreement. Only trade statisticians from the National Statistics Offices of Fiji and PNG responded, but their data had a lot of gaps. Questions sent to them were not answered.

### The need for a workshop

- 4. The reason for holding this workshop was twofold:
  - a. the first was to deepen the knowledge of the Pacific Islands statisticians on PTAs applicable in the region and the practice through which the goods are traded under these preferences;
  - b. the second was to identify goods traded under the PTAs for the compilation of detailed, reliable and timely official statistics.
- 5. Statistics on goods traded under the PTAs are needed by the Pacific Island Governments for the effective monitoring of the implementation of the PTAs, and for meaningful policy formulation leading to positive adjustments to enhance trade.

### Objective of the workshop

6. The objective of the workshop was to bring together experts with different skills e.g. experts on PTAs, border agencies, statisticians, private sector, businesses, IT, macroeconomists and users,

to be able to address issues and share practical approaches to improving access to, and the quality of statistics on goods traded under the PTAs.

## **Expected outcomes from the workshop**

- 7. The expected outcomes from the workshop are for the:
  - a. Pacific Island Statisticians' knowledge and skills enhanced/deepened on PTAs applicable in the region and the practice through which the goods are traded under these preferences.
  - b. Customs Administrations to be clear on the data needs of Statisticians.
  - c. Tables on re-exports and **all** PTAs to be completed by June 2018.
  - d. Convey SPC's views on its decision to compile the Pacific Commodity Trade Database (PAC Comtrade).
  - e. Networking established to allow countries to share information and assist each other.

#### Outcomes and recommendations

### **Knowledge gained on Preferential Trade Agreements**

- 8. The presentations focused on a range of PTAs that are currently in force or have been signed in the region and these included:
  - a. World Trade Organisation (WTO) Agreements:
    - i. General Agreement on Tariffs and Trade (GATT)
    - ii. General Agreement on Trade in Services (GATS)
    - iii. Trade Related Aspects of Intellectual Property Rights (TRIPS)
  - b. European Union Papua New Guinea-Fiji Interim Economic Partnership Agreement (iEPA).
  - c. South Pacific Regional Trade & Economic Cooperation Agreement (SPARTECA), which is a non-reciprocal trade agreement where the textiles, clothing and footwear industry is the major beneficiary.
  - d. Pacific Agreement on Closer Economic Relations Plus (PACER Plus), which is a Free Trade Agreement (FTA) covering goods, services, investment and labor mobility.
  - e. The Pacific Island Countries Trade Agreement (PICTA) and its associated Protocols on Trade in Services and Temporary Movement of Natural Persons.
  - f. The Melanesian Spearhead Group Trade Agreement (MSGTA2), members of which are Fiji, Papua New Guinea, Solomon Islands and Vanuatu promotes and strengthens intra-member trade in goods and the signed, yet to be ratified Melanesian Free Trade Agreement (MFTA) covers trade in services, labour mobility and cross-border investments, with a view to foster economic growth and sustainable development.
  - g. Micronesian Trade and Economic Community (MTEC), which is a sub-regional trade and economic cooperation and integration agreements for three North Pacific Nations: the Federated States of Micronesia, the Republic of the Marshall Islands and Palau.
  - h. Other Bilateral Trade Agreements, which are agreements between two countries.
- 9. The presentations focused on each agreement highlighting:
  - a. the qualification criteria and the levels of preferences available to the private sector.

- b. how the preferential trade transactions can be included in the relevant statistical reports, and the role of various agencies such as the Trade Department, the Customs Department, Customs Brokers, Importers/Exporters, etc.
- 10. Knowledge on PTAs were further strengthened with the participation of the Private Sector Organisations, both through presentation to the participants and the Panel Discussion. Highlights included:
  - a. The need for the establishment of a Regional Database on PTAs and for it to have simplified information publicly available on them as this then would lead to more awareness raising (Private Sector/Customs) focusing in particular on the Rules of Origin.
  - b. Balancing the interest of the various stakeholders involved in the process, noting the ultimate goal of PTAs is to contribute to economic growth and sustainable development of the nation.
  - c. Setting clear pathways into the future on approaches for enhancing effectiveness of regional trade agreements.
  - d. Priority challenges facing the Private Sector:
    - i. Trade Logistics including Infrastructure
    - ii. Trade Financing and Border Security Concerns
  - e. Need to ensure consistency in trade and investment data held by Statistics, Central Banks, Trade and Investment Promotion Agencies, Diplomatic Missions etc.
  - f. Integrity of Statistics and Governance lack of statistics available on commodity trade data was **the** major issue
  - g. Future prospects for consolidating Pacific free trade agreements
- 11. Engaging in PTAs leads to greater integration into the global economy via trade liberalization. This allows easier access of exporters to overseas markets. While exporters benefit from lower or removal of tariffs, tariffs on imports impact Government revenue. Therefore, to be able to understand the PTAs in entirety, a session was devoted to Options to Replace Expected Revenue Loss from Trade Taxes in Pacific Forum Island Countries. This session allowed participants to not only look at the benefits of engaging in PTAs, but it also dwelled on the flipside of PTAs and ways to address its negative impact.

### **Identifying Goods Traded Under the Preferential Trade Agreements**

- 12. The presentations focused on the:
  - a. the responsibility of OCO to implement the tariff liberalization commitments and application of Rules of Origin under the PTAs.
  - b. role of Customs Administrations in the implementation of PTAs.
  - c. the importance of tariff classification and the regional work on the formulation of the PACHS17, a multipurpose goods nomenclature that forms the basis for Customs Tariffs and IMTS and which:
    - i. enhances transparency in the classification process for goods in the region
    - ii. establishes uniformity of application in the classification of goods
    - iii. simplifies the tariff nomenclature system to facilitate trade in the region
    - iv. has been correlated to the United Nations (UN) Standard International Trade Classification (SITC) to ensure correct classification of tradable goods to be used in Macroeconomics.
- 13. Presentations from participating customs officials highlighted national processes in claiming preferential rates under the PTAs, the process of providing statistics to their National Statistics Offices (NSO) and the various challenges regarding the compilation of trade statistics.

- 14. An important part in the compilation of IMTS is the information technology system used by Customs, since Customs is the preferred and recommended source for the compilation of IMTS. Presentations by the:
  - a. United Nations Conference on Trade and Development (UNCTAD) on Automated System for Customs Data (ASYCUDA) World informed of the system's capability in producing data on goods traded under the different PTAs.
  - b. Statistics New Zealand provided an update on the status of PC Trade use for members: a review of the PC Trade is currently underway by OCO to assess its operability at the national level.

### Supplementary session on Fish and its relevance to SDG 14

15. A session was devoted to <u>The Blue Pacific</u> as a new narrative for collective political action in the Pacific that calls for working together as one Blue Ocean Continent. In doing so, *The Blue Pacific* aims to harness the shared ocean identity, geography and resources to drive positive change in the Pacific's socio-cultural, political and economic development, and these are wrapped around the underlying need for statistical data.

#### Hands on experience

- 16. The Group Work by participants on interpreting the provisions of the PTAs to determine how different products may be given different preferential treatment depending on the type of accompanying documents presented at the border was assuring that the sessions on PTAs were well understood by the participants.
- 17. The assignment given to participants on Fish statistics showed that data needed were available, but the important aspect of the compilation is the use of a standard recommended methodology for the data to be compared regionally and internationally.
- 18. Compilation of data on goods traded under MSG showed that the data were generally available. It was the lack of understanding of the PTAs, outdated HS codes and the identification or the absence of procedure codes that were hindering the compilation of statistics.

#### Way forward

### 19. Recommendation 1

Table 4 on re-exports and Table 11 and its sub-components on al PTAs to be completed by 30 June 2018.

#### 20. Recommendation 2

For countries that have not adopted HS 2017 to use the PACHS17.

a. OCO is currently using the PACHS17 for update to HS 2017 of members that have yet to implement HS 2017.

#### 21. Recommendation 3

**Customs Administrations to:** 

- a. Assign procedure codes to transactions to enable identification of goods traded.
- b. Document what the variables in a SAD/Warrant mean for statisticians to understand the transactions better.
- c. Strengthen its analytical capacities for effective use of data.
- d. Provide ongoing training of customs brokers and agents to ensure the correct application and submission of key information on HS Codes, Statistical Value, Country of Origin etc.

e. For the users of ASYCUDA world, to work closely with the UNCTAD ASYCUDA Support Mechanism for Pacific (ASMP) Office to ensure that trade data are captured correctly and to provide NSOs complete and accurate electronic data to ensure credible IMTS to be compiled.

#### 22. Recommendation 4

Statistics for Development Division (SDD) of SPC to seek collaboration with willing partners to develop the PAC Comtrade database which is supported by the Forum Economic Ministers (Para 49 and 50 of PIFS 2014 Forum Economic Ministers Meeting (FEMM) Action Plan).

#### 23. Recommendation 5

Collaboration, similar to the one at the workshop needs to continue for work relating to IMTS: "the best results can be obtained through different knowledge and skills working together".

a. There is established processes at national level in the provision of data from Customs to Statistics Departments. Collaborations between the two agencies need to be strengthened to ensure timely provision of data.

#### 24. Recommendation 6

Statisticians to continue to:

- a. provide training on recommended methodology
- b. build capacity to be able to sustain and strengthen compilation of IMTS

#### 25. Recommendation 7

Customs Administrations and NSOs need to strengthen their working relationship —

- a. Regular meetings between the two where users can be invited
- b. Understand statistical requirements
- c. Point of contact needs to be established between the two

#### 26. Recommendation 8

Users should continue to make their data demands known for NSOs to be able to assess the demand for external trade statistics so that within the limited resources available to them, they are better placed to plan and produce IMTS.

#### 27. Recommendation 9

SDD of SPC to create an information page on Fish, including fish trade PTA data, in consultation with PIFS and have member countries populate it on a regular basis.

#### 28. Recommendation 10

Further capacity building training on PTAs, including Rules of Origin (ROO) and HS Codes for Customs Administrators, NSO and the private sector.

#### 29. Recommendation 11

SPC to discuss with OCO the possibility of developing a Harmonised Regional Procedure Code for the Region.
