







CASE STUDY – FV BANDAR NELAYAN

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






SITUATION

- Indonesian SAR Authority BASARNAS advised JRCC Australia the Indonesian FV BANDAR NELAYAN was taking on water and sinking
- 35m vessel had 20 people onboard (Initial report of 26)
- 650nm from Perth, Australia









Day 1 (Night search)

- Challenger Perth based aircraft located semi submerged vessel (1600 UTC +6 hours)
- Life rafts dropped











Day 2


Fishing fleet information request to: MRCC China, MRCC Taipei, Japan Coast Guard

Request for Australian military assistance

Japanese fishing vessel FUKUSEKI MARU 15 diverted to assist (ETA 15 May, +37

hours)











Day 2 Continued

- Australian military aircraft locates the vessel in daylight (+18.5 hours)
- Survivors observed on bow and entering life rafts
- Australian military vessel diverted to assist (ETA 15 May +39 hours)
- 4 aircraft missions (military and civilian)









Day 3

 FV FUKUSEKI MARU 15 arrived in the area and recovered all 20 survivors, nil missing (+36 hours)

Australian Navy warship rendezvous with Fukuseki Maru 15 and transferred

survivors (+42 hours)

All aerial assets released from tasking

Australian Navy warship enroute Perth










TIMELINE









Incident conclusion

 Australian Navy warship returned to the Australian coastline and evacuated one injured survivor via helicopter to Perth hospital.

 Due to Covid-19 restrictions in Western Australia the remaining 19 survivors on board were unable to be landed, instead were transferred to Indonesian

authorities in Bali









ANALYSIS

What went well

- Communication relay between Japanese fishing vessel / Japan Coast Guard and JRCC Australia
- Solid relationship with Defence aiding in availability of assets

What could be done more effectively

- Confirmation of number of crew onboard
- No EPIRB onboard leading to delayed response
