The intention of this report is to present an overview of the Cook Islands population as enumerated on December 1st 2016 in the Census of Population and Dwellings.

This is the second of many reports relating to the 2016 Census that this office will be producing. The first report was the preliminary result, released in January 2017 soon after the population count.

This report is presented in six sections: (i) General information (ii) Census Administration (iii) Census Result (iv) and (iv) Basic tables. This report presents a wealth of information on the demographic, social and economic situation of the Cook Islands. It helps us understand who we are and where we've come since the last census in 2011. It also provides information on the diversity of activities throughout our islands.

This report could not have been produced without the people of the Cook Islands. They deserve to be praised for giving their invaluable support by cooperating and providing their information without hesitation. Additionally, Census Supervisors and Enumerators who did most of the hard fieldwork need to be commended for their efforts and dedication during the enumeration period (*a full list of those involved can be found at the end of this report*). It is certainly no simple job to visit and obtain personal information from every individual and household in the country.

SECTION 1: GENERAL INFORMATION

1. Introduction

This report contains the results of the 2016 Census of Population and Dwellings undertaken on 1st December 2016. This census was conducted under the authority of the Statistics Act, 1966. The confidentiality provisions in this act provide against the release or publication of any particulars relating to individuals.

This is the tenth census undertaken by the Statistics Office, the first being in 1971. Prior to this the Cook Island censuses were conducted by the Registrar General of the Justice Department. Since the annexation of the Cook Islands by New Zealand regular census activities have been held every five years. The census counts all persons present in the Cook Islands on census night, including visitors temporary in the country. Cook Islanders who are living or are temporarily on vacation abroad are excluded.

2. Setting

Cook Islands consist of 15 islands and atolls that are spread over 2million sq. km of the South Pacific Ocean. The Cook Islands is defined as all the islands between 156 - 167 ° West and 8-23 ° South. Such distances over the sea linking small populations' presents an imposing hindrance to the development of an efficient transportation and communication system.


The total land area of the Cook Islands is 23,261 hectares while its exclusive economic zone covers an area of nearly 2 million sq. km or 750,000 sq. miles. Rarotonga, with a total land area of 6,719 hectares is the largest and most populous island (over 50% of the population) and also the administrative centre.

1. Cook Islands on the Map

Cook Islands is a Polynesian island nation located midway between French Polynesia and Niue in the Pacific region. It consists of fifteen islands and has a total land area of 2.2 million square kilometres. The main island Rarotonga is the urban area of Cook Islands and the density is 2,205 inhabitants per square kilometre (203 in outer rural atolls). The Cook Islands is a representative democracy with a parliamentary system having an associated state relationship with New Zealand. The head of state is the Queen of New Zealand, who is represented in the Cook Islands by the Queen's Representative.



The islands are geographically divided into two groups, commonly referred to as the Northern and Southern Group islands. The two groups of islands portray marked differences in their social, cultural and economic activities. The Northern Group islands remain relatively isolated from the Southern Group islands.

However, being a remote country has its own positive effects, this makes Cook Islands a largely unspoiled destination for tourists. Tourism is the country's leading source of revenue accounting for around 60 percent of the GDP. It plays a vital role in correcting the balance of payments and is a long-term opportunity. The country experienced a massive development of tourism during the country's celebration of its 50th anniversary of self-government in 2015 - mostly coming from New Zealand and Australia.



SECTION 2: CENSUS ADMINISTRATION

1. Organisation

The overall organisation and control of the census, by virtue of the Statistics Act 2016, is vested upon the Government Statistician who, for the purpose of the census will be referred to as the Census Officer. A number of sections of the Act apply in carrying out the census. These include the “confidentiality” clause, which provides against the release or publication of any individual particulars and the offences and penalty clauses, which may be invoked against any persons failing to abide by the provisions of the Act.

2. Scope and Coverage

The scope of the early Cook Islands censuses was limited; in fact they consisted of head counts only. With the passage of time the census has expanded. Gradually, questions on sex, age, marital status, religion, education, employment, etc., have been included. Questions on unpaid work and income earned were included for the first time in the 1996 Census. In the 2016 Census, questions on relationship to head of household was expanded to reflect household living arrangement.

A personal questionnaire is completed for every man, woman and child alive at midnight on census night within the geographical boundaries of the Cook Islands. The Census excludes those persons on foreign vessels, yachts and aircraft flying through or stopping temporarily (transit). A dwelling questionnaire is completed for every occupied dwelling as at midnight on census night.

3. Objectives of the Census

Taking account of the many comments, evaluations and recommendations arising from the 2011 Census, the design of the 2016 Census is based on a number of key strategic aims:

- to give the highest priority to getting the national and local population counts right
- to maximise overall response and minimise differences in response rates in specific areas and among particular population sub-groups
- to build effective partnerships with other organisations, particularly local authorities, in planning and executing the field operation
- to provide high quality, value-for-money, fit-for-purpose statistics that meet user needs
- to protect, and be seen to protect, confidential personal census information

4. The selection of topics and questions

The topic content of the 2016 Census has been driven largely by the demands and requirements of users of census statistics, the evaluation of the 2016 and 2011 Census, and the priority of government as stated in the National Strategic Development Plan of the Cook Islands (NSDP) and the advice and guidance of organizations with experience of similar operations. These have been determined by extensive consultation with various Ministries of government and NGO's.

5. The census questions

The topics proposed for the census are those that have been shown to be most needed by the major users of census information and for which questions have been devised that can be expected to produce reliable and accurate data. In each case, no other comparable and accessible source of the information is available in combination with other items in the census.

Consultation on the topic content for the 2016 Census has (as ever) resulted in a much larger demand for questions than would be possible to accommodate on a census form that households could reasonably be expected to complete. Consequently a number of difficult decisions have had to be made in assessing the different requirements for information and balancing the needs for change against continuity.

In assessing which topics should be included in the census, Statistics Office has had to consider a number of factors. The criteria for evaluating the strength of users' requirements for information were that:

- there should be a clearly demonstrated and significant need
- the information collected was of major national importance
- users' requirements could not adequately be met by information from other sources
- there should be a requirement for multivariate analysis (that is the ability to cross-analyse one variable against other), and
- there should be consideration of the ability for comparison with previous censuses wherever possible

6. Census fieldwork

- Staffing - efforts to mobilize field enumerators have been slow but as of end of July we have managed to confirm 20 Field Supervisors and 120 Field Enumerators.
- Transportation - Transportation to the Northern Group have always been difficult and expensive. Cost of chartering transport is estimated to slightly over \$NZ 100k and plans to cost share with other agencies were negotiated.

7. Concepts and Definitions

A full list of definitions and terms used for the Census of Population and Dwellings 2016 is contained in the instruction manual, but the following should be emphasized.

- Census night is the night between the 30th November and the 1st December 2016. The census time-point is midnight of that night.
- Dwelling is a building or group of buildings or part of a building occupied by at least one household on census night.
- Household is a group of persons, related or unrelated, living together under the same roof sharing the same kitchen or contributing to a common budget. One member of the group is regarded as the head. The term family is synonymous in this respect. (Note: a household can consist of one person).


SECTION 3: CENSUS RESULTS

1. Population Demographic Characteristics

1.1 Population Structure

The total population of the Cook Islands, as enumerated on 1 December 2016, was 17,434 people: 8,520 men and 8,914 women. As the census was a *de facto* count, this number included all persons present at census night in the Cook Islands excluding residents away from the Cook Islands at the time of the census (even if they intended to be away only for a short time). This population count reflects a decrease of 360 people since the 2011 Census (17,794).

Figure 1: Population Composition





1.2 Population Trend

Figure 2 shows the population of the Cook Islands from 1902 to 2016. The Cook Islands population has continuously increased from the beginning of the last century reaching 21,322 in 1971 but declined dramatically during the early 70s, especially between 1971 and 1976, as a result of the opening of Rarotonga's International Airport in 1974, when many people took the opportunity to migrate to New Zealand.

Between 1986 and 1996, the population has slowly recovered and was growing by about 150 people per year. However, since 1996 the population decreased again, especially its resident population. One contributing factor to this decline was the Government's restructure of the public service in 1996-97 whereby the number of public servants was reduced from 3,000 to less than 2,000 employees. Despite the overall trend of a declining Cook Islands population, Rarotonga's total population is slowly picking up.



Nearly 75 per cent (13,007) of the total population lived on Rarotonga, 19.1 per cent (3,326) in the Southern Group islands and 6.3 per cent (1,101) in the Northern Group islands. The population density varied island by island. While there were about 342 people per km² in Pukapuka, only 7 people per km² inhabited Mitiaro Island. The population density of Rarotonga was 194 people per square kilometre.

1.4 Age and Sex

Population pyramids, sometimes called an age picture diagram (Figure 3) are often viewed as the most effective way to graphically depict the age and sex structure of a population.

A distinct feature of the Cook Islands population pyramid in 2016 is the indent in the 0-4 age group, which is smaller than the number of 5-9 year olds is indicative of a decline in fertility and/or greater emigration from the Cook Islands.

Significant decrease can also be observed in the 15-19 age groups which were the 10-24 cohort groups in 2011. We can assume that these are young Cook Islanders who have completed secondary education and have travelled overseas for further education or employment opportunities.

Another way of looking at the population structure is through dependency ratios relating to the number of young and old people who do not, or no longer work, to the economically active population 15-59 or 64. Cook Islands dependency ratio is 72, meaning for every 100 persons of working age there are 72 dependent children and aged persons.

1.5 Internal Migration

A question on usual residence one year ago provides information on inward migration in the year leading up to the census. Based on the question where one lived one year before the census, 86.1 per cent of the

resident population had not moved from their current place of residence and 6.6 per cent were living elsewhere in the Cook Islands. About 5.8 per cent of the resident population moved to the Cook Islands in the year to December 2016.

Nearly sixty five per cent of the resident population in 2016 had not moved from their current place of residence. 12.8 per cent lived elsewhere within the Cook Islands while 13.8 per cent lived overseas. 15.4 per cent of the Rarotonga residents were living overseas five years ago.

2. Social Characteristics

2.1 Place of Birth

Fifty-three per cent (7,828) of the total resident population were living at the same place they were born; 18 per cent (2,684) were born in the Cook Islands but not at their current (December 2016) place of residence, and 29 per cent (4,290) of the resident population was born overseas (Table 4 below or Table 2.1 in the appendices).

Seventy one per cent (10,512) of all Cook Islands residents were born in the Cook Islands and the remaining 29 per cent (4,290) were born outside the Cook Islands.

Overall 52 per cent of the Rarotonga residents were born in Rarotonga, 34 per cent were born overseas, 11 per cent in the Southern Group islands, and 3 per cent in the Northern Group islands. About 58 per cent of the Southern and Northern Group islands' residents were born there, 16 per cent were born overseas, and 26 per cent were born in Rarotonga.

2.2 Ethnicity

Cook Islands Maori population accounted for 78 per cent or 11,570 persons, down from 83 per cent in 2006 and 81 per cent in 2011. Non-Cook Island Maori population is on the increase accounting for 7 per cent of the population in 2006 to 14 per cent in 2016. Most of them resides on Rarotonga the centre of commercial and government activities.



2.3 Marital Status

Marital status is the most common measure of family relationship collected in the census. During the 2016 census, 43.6 per cent of the population aged 15 and older were legally married, 45.5 per cent (2,380) males and 41.9 per cent of females (2,336). The proportion never married (single), were 33 per cent of males (1,726) and 30.9 per cent of females (1,723). Those in a de facto relationship also increased from 12.4 per cent in 2011 to 14.1 per cent in 2016. The ratio of women who were widowed more than doubled men 73.5 per cent reflecting a trend where women are living longer. Same-sex civil partnership was not captured in the census.

2.4 Households and Families

This is the first time a question on relationship between household members was asked in the census whereas previous censuses asked about the relationship of each members to a reference person or head of household. In terms of their living arrangements, 5.2 per cent reported to living alone and over 50 per cent of those are 60 years and over. The majority, 77.1 per cent resided with their immediate family.

2.5 Religious Denomination

The question on religion was not compulsory, nevertheless, only 2 per cent or 323 people refused or did not respond to this question.

While Cook Islands' denomination remains predominantly Cook Islands Christian Church (CICC), with 49 per cent (7,225); however, its share has declined from 53 per cent in 2006 to 49 per cent in 2016. Much of this decline came from Rarotonga. The next largest group was the Roman Catholic Church with 2,574 members, with a share of 17 per cent of all denominations followed by Seventh Day Adventist Church (SDA) with 8 per cent share or 1,249 members. All other denominations had less than 8 per cent of the resident population as members. Those with no religion or did not state any religion at all now account for just over 7 per cent of the population (7.4%).

2.6 Physical Challenges

Although the question on physical disability was asked for every Cook Islands resident, it was more appropriate to tabulate the data for only those 10 years and older. Each person was asked if they had a health problems lasting for more than 6 months. From the result 2914 persons reported to have a disability or a health problem which was 24 percent of the resident population 10 years and older. Refer to Table 2.06 and 2.07 in the tables.

2.7 Use of and access to Information Technology (Communication)

Almost 100 per cent of households had access to information communication technology with only 49 households reporting to no access. Cell phone was the most popular means of communication technology with 82.8 per cent of households, followed by phone/fax at home with 58.3 per cent of all households. Internet at home is gaining popularity with 41 per cent of households now have internet or wi-fi connections. Compared to 2011 households continued to have preference for these three means of communication technology.

2.8 Smoking and Drinking Habits

Approximately 68 percent of the population aged 15 years and older have consumed alcohol but 11.2 percent reported to no longer drinking. Drinking is more frequent in the male population at 62.4 percent compared to females 52 percent. Regular drinkers are between ages 20 to 54.

2.9 Cultural Activity


About 40.3 per cent of the population 15 years and older do not actively participate in cultural activity. For the remaining 59.7 per cent, the majority are spectators. Performers make up 24.3 per cent and about 13.3 per cent are engaged in making costumes, composers and choreographers together make up 8.9 per cent and 5.5 per cent practices local medicine. Most of the performers are in the younger age group 15 to 34 years. Choreographers are younger, over 50 per cent are around 15 to 44 years, whereas composers are older between the ages of 40 to 64 years. This makes sense since choreographers introduces modern moves or action and develop new interpretations of existing dances.

3. Education Characteristics

3.1 School enrolment

Education in the Cook Islands is free and compulsory from ages 5 to 15 years. This has ensured access to primary (grades 1-6) and secondary (forms 1-7) level of education for all. There are 31 schools of which 23 are government and 8 are privately administered (5 church schools and 3 independent). At the 2016 census, 2,981 persons 5 to 15 years old were enrolled in school, 1,528 males and 1,453 females, nearly 100 percent (99.6) when compared to the population in that age group.

The proportion of 13 and 14 year olds attending school were, 99 and 98 per cent respectively. While the enrolment rates declined further after the age of 14, when more and more students dropped out of school, the proportion of enrolled males decreased faster than that of females. While 100 per cent of females still attended schools at age 15, only 95 per cent of males did. At age 16 the proportions were 72 and 82 per cent of males and females respectively. At age 18, only 24 to 30 per cent of all males and females were still attending school, and only 2 per cent of persons aged 20-24 years were still in school.

The majority (81 per cent) of all pupils were enrolled in public schools, while only 19 per cent went to private schools. In Rarotonga 27 per cent of all pupils went to private schools. Nearly all (99.9 per cent) of the 5-12 year olds are enrolled at school. From that age onward, enrolment rates declined.

3.2 Highest primary or secondary level completed

About 66 per cent has attended secondary school (Form 1-6), and 10.4 per cent of males and 12.1 per cent of females completed form 7¹. The proportion of attending or completing secondary education was higher in Rarotonga than in the Outer Islands.

There is very little difference in the proportion of males and females that have attended and/or completed the different educational levels. Persons aged 20-24 years had the highest proportion that has completed secondary education. Twenty per cent of females completed secondary education compared to 15 per cent of males.



3.3 Secondary School Qualification

The proportion of the resident population with no educational qualifications was 62 per cent of males and 57 per cent of females (Figure 6 below). The older the population, the more likely it was that they had no educational qualifications; 85 and 92 per cent of males and females older than 65 years had no qualifications.

Figure 6: Resident population 15 years and over with highest educational qualification gained




Nearly 50 per cent of females and 43.8 per cent of males had secondary qualifications, and 11.2 per cent of females and 9.7 per cent of males had tertiary qualifications. The proportion of people with no qualifications was much higher in the Outer Islands than in Rarotonga, where the proportion of people with secondary education was more than twice as high as in the Outer Islands.

3.4 Trade vocational/ professional qualification

The vast majority (74 per cent) of the resident population 15 years and over did not state any qualifications at all and about 0.7 per cent stated having none. 25.3 per cent indicated having some kind of qualification.

Generally, males were more likely to have a qualification than females but there were more females than males who has certificates, diplomas and degrees. The number of persons with a qualification gradually increased with increasing age of the population. The highest percentage of people with a qualification was in the age group 40-54 years. Noticeably is the high number of Doctorate and Masters Qualification, from 3 in 2006 to 172 in 2011 to 198 in 2016.

4. Economic and labor force Characteristics

4.1 Activity Status

Out of a total of 10,805 residents 15 years and older, 69 per cent (7,456) were economically active and the rest, 3,349 were not economically active, these include full time students; persons who were retired, and those engaged in full time home duties. About 36 per cent were male and 33 per cent were females. There were more females in home duties than male.

4.2 Labour Force

Total labour force of the Cook Islands is 7,774 people. This is defined as those in self-employments, (988), paid employees (6,028), unpaid workers and volunteers (305) and unemployed (453). Labour force indicators as shown in Table 10 shows a Labor Force Participation Rate (LFPR) of 71.9 per cent, Employment Population Ratio (EPR) was 64.9 and Unemployment rate of 5.8 per cent. Labour force participation rates were higher for males (77.2) than for females (67.0), so was the employment-population ratio with 70.0 and 60.2 for males and females respectively.

4.3 Non-Labour Force

The non-labour force included people who are not economically active such as students, retired persons and people who are engaged in full time home duties. They comprised 28.1 per cent of the population 15 years and older. About 34.7 per cent were engaged in home duties (1,051), 39.3 per cent were retired (1,192) and 20.5 per cent (620) were students. There were slightly more female students (314) than male students (306). However, there were also more female retirees (651) than male retirees (541). The proportion of the non- labour force as part of the total population was much larger in the outer islands than in Rarotonga.

4.4 Employment Sector

The private sector including sole proprietors and partnership was the largest employer, employing 65 per cent of all employees followed by the public sector with 26 per cent. However, there was great variation

in the importance of sectors of employment among the region. While the public sector employed only 20 per cent of all employees in Rarotonga, it was about 46 per cent in the Outer Islands. The proportion of public sector employment was as high as 100 per cent in Nassau to 20 per cent in Aitutaki.

4.5 Unemployment

According to the international definition of unemployment, only those people who indicated that they were available for work and were actively seeking for work would be classified as unemployed. There were 453 people that categorized themselves as unemployed; 200 males and 253 females. This translates into an unemployment rate of 5.0 per cent for males and 6.8 per cent for females. Unemployment is slightly higher in the Southern Group (7.9 per cent) than in the outer islands and especially so in the youth groups aged 15–24 years. Young women and men make up about one third of all unemployed men and women.


4.6 Occupation

The biggest occupational group was the ‘Service and Sales Workers’ with 22.4 per cent of all employees, equally followed by the Managers and Professional groups with 13.2 and 13.1 per cent respectively.

Females are more dominant in service occupations like shop assistant, housekeeping and caregiving with 62.9 per cent share of all service workers. Clerical support workers are also an area dominated by women along with the Professional group where nursing and teaching professionals are classified. 63.8 per cent of those in the professional group are women.

Men can be found in the craft and trades work, 9.0 per cent of all employees or 86.6 per cent of those in that type of occupations doing work such as constructing and maintenance of buildings, welding, erecting heavy metal structures, etc.. Surprisingly Management jobs are equally among both sexes with 53.3 per cent males and 46.7 per cent females. Figure 8 graphically gives a clear illustration of the distribution.

Figure 8: Resident population 15 years and older by sex and occupation




4.7 Industry

The Accommodation and Food Service is the largest industry employing 20.9 per cent of all employees, closely followed by Wholesale and Retail Trade with 15.8 per cent and Public Administration with 15.0 per cent. The rest of the sectors make up 48.4 percent concentrating mainly in the transport industry (Fig 9).

Females dominated the Education and Health industry and the ‘Finance and Business Services’ industry presumably working as shop assistants and bank tellers. Males dominated the ‘Construction’ and ‘Agriculture and Fishing’ industry.

4.8 Income


Information on income is recorded in ranges as it is thought that respondents are more willing to give a range for income than they are to state the precise value. However, there is a loss of accuracy in obtaining ranges only, as the calculation of average incomes would be based on the midpoint of the range and also income information in the census is usually very approximate.

The average annual income of the resident population 15 years and older was \$17,221, males \$18,677 and females \$15,856. Income levels in Rarotonga were more than double than in the Outer Islands. Over 12 per cent of the population had no income, while 3.3 per cent had an income of more than \$40,000 per annum. Most males were in the income group \$10,000-\$14,999, similar to females and a complete change over when compared to 2011 census where most females were in the income group of 'less than \$5,000'.

5. Fertility Characteristics

In order to determine the level and pattern of fertility in the Cook Islands, all women older than 15 years of age were asked the following questions:

- How many live births they have ever had;
- The date of birth of her first child; and
- The date of birth of her last child.

The total number of children ever born to women aged 15 years and older was 13,787. Out of the total of 5,577 women aged 15 years and older, 3,903 (70 per cent) had at least one child, and 30 per cent (1,674) have not had a child. Based on the number of childless women aged 50 years and older, childlessness was about 14 per cent (Table 8). Of all women who had children, most had 1-3 children. Two per cent or 97 women had 10 or more.

The average number of children ever born to all women (average parity) was 2.5 children per woman. The average parity increases with the age of women. While the 15-19 year old women had on average only 0.1 children (every tenth woman had one child), women aged 45-49 had nearly 3 children, and women older than 65 years of age had on average 5 children. The average parities of women older than 49 years is also called the '*Completed Fertility Rate*', a cohort measure demonstrating how many children a certain cohort of women who completed their childbearing actually produced during those years.

Those women who have had children, 42 per cent had their first child when they were between the age of 20 and 24 years and about 24.8 per cent had their last child between the age of 30 and 34 years. About 0.9 per cent of women had their first child below the age of 15 years and about 0.8 per cent of all women had their last child at the age of 45 years and over.

6. Private households building/housing characteristics

A total of 4,435 private dwellings were occupied on Census night, compared to 4,372 in 2011 showing a slight increase of 1.4 per cent (63 dwellings) resulting from an increasing number of dwellings in Rarotonga of 2.5 per cent (79 dwellings). However the Southern Group remained almost unchanged. Northern Group islands experienced a decrease of 6.1 per cent (17 dwellings) during the period.

Average household size remained at 3.5 persons per household in the 2011 and 2016 census from 3.7 persons per household in the 2006. The assumption is that Cook Islanders have moved away from living in extended households, towards a nuclear type family and choosing smaller size families. Southern Group has the smallest household size with 3.4 persons per household, down from 3.8 in 2006 and 3.6 in 2011.

7. Private households socio-economic characteristics

7.1 Dwelling Tenure

Of the 4,435 private dwellings in the Cook Islands, 2,523 (56.9 per cent) were owned outright, a 4.3 per cent increase over the 2011 census. As expected, the majority of houses on the outer islands are owned outright compared to those on Rarotonga. People on Rarotonga have greater access to financing opportunities thus have a higher proportion (92.4 per cent) of dwellings that have direct loan or mortgage repayment commitments.

Dwellings that were being occupied either free of charge or provided free with employment was 608 compared to 633 dwellings in 2011. 516 dwellings have direct loan or mortgage repayment commitments compared to 576 dwellings in 2011 recording a minor decrease of 60 dwellings over the 2011 Census. Rented dwellings totalled 788 compared to 742 in 2011, an increase of 6.2 per cent over 2011. Of the rented dwellings, 765 (97.1 per cent) were located on Rarotonga. The majority of the rental properties were rented between \$150 to \$299 per week.

7.2 Year Dwelling was constructed

There has been a significant increase in the number of private dwellings constructed since the 1960's and in each decade as illustrated in Figure 11 below, the number of dwellings have steadily increased to 984 between the years 2000 and 2009 and 620 from 2010 to 2016.

7.3 Housing/Dwelling Structure and Number of Rooms

The 2016 census reported 2,453 (57.6 per cent) of private dwellings were constructed of concrete blocks, 37.2 per cent of hardboard, wood or timber and 5.2 per cent of other materials. Over 95.0 per cent have iron roofing while the remaining have roofs of kikau and other materials. Concrete flooring predominates in the Cook Islands, being found in 86.0 per cent of dwellings. The average number of rooms per dwelling in 2016 for the Cook Islands was 5 compared to 4 in 2011 with over 71.9 per cent reported in Rarotonga.

7.4 Source and Supply of Water

The public water main remain the main source of water supply in 2016 with 3,700 (83.4 per cent) households compared to 3,830 households in 2011, down by 130 (3.4 per cent). 90.8 per cent of the Rarotonga households had water supplied directly from the public water main.

The next common source is the water tank with 2,796 (63.0 per cent) households compared to 1,790 reported in the 2011 census. This is the main source of water supply found in the outer islands with 98.5 per cent of all households in the Northern islands have water tanks; 87.2 per cent in the southern islands and a little over 50 per cent in Rarotonga.

For those households with water tanks, 1,621 (58.0 per cent) reported having water piped to both inside and outside of their dwelling and 716 (25.6 per cent) reported having water piped only to outside of their dwelling. In the 2011 Census over half or 55.5 per cent collect their water from their roof, a significant shift when compared to the 2016 Census where only 35.4 per cent collect water from the public water main.

The main sources of drinking water reported by households in 2016 was the filtered tap water (57.1 per cent), 34.2 per cent reported bottled or bought water and 26.0 per cent reported to rainwater tank. Filtered tap water and bottled or bought water was more common in Rarotonga compared to the outer islands which are heavily dependent on rainwater tanks as their main source of drinking water.

7.5 Household Facilities and Amenities

Those households with no electricity account for only 0.7 per cent of all dwellings. The majority, 96.3 per cent are connected to the grid and increasingly 14.6 per cent are connected to the solar panels (renewable energy) with the remaining 1.0 per cent still reliant on generators.

Households' access to selected household facilities reported 88.7 per cent (3,932) had bath or shower, 86.2 per cent had kitchen sink while other household facilities reported include 29.0 per cent had solar water heaters, 28.3 per cent had water filters, 28.3 per cent had gas water heaters and 45.4 per cent had water pumps all of which are mostly in Rarotonga.

With regards to toilet facilities, 4,164 (93.9 per cent) households had flush toilet compared to 3,639 reported in 2006 indicating a slight increase of 10.7 per cent with 76.7 per cent (3,192) located in Rarotonga.

7.6 Kitchen appliances

Gas stoves ranked highest in kitchen appliances used by households for cooking with 98.6 per cent of all households using as a means of cooking. The number of kitchen appliances owned by households included 3,848 electric jugs, 3,474 toasters, 2,507 microwaves, 2,005 electric frying pans, 1,840 barbecues, 2,111 rice cookers and 2,210 food processors. Rarotonga reported to owning over 60.0 per cent of these cooking utensils. Compared to 2011 the numbers of food processors and rice cookers have increased.

Of the fuel available for cooking, the majority (95.7 per cent) of the private dwellings reported gas as their main source of cooking fuel, 1,914 (43.2 per cent) use electricity and the remaining (less than 10 per cent) uses wood, solar power and kerosene. On average Rarotonga households use gas at least 25 days in a month followed by electricity. This is a similar trend throughout the whole of the Cook Islands.

7.7 Power Tools, white wares and entertainment equipment

Ownership of power tools by households ranked electric drill as the most common tool owned with 2,350 then 1,704 circular saws, 1,640 battery chargers and 1,290 sanders. With respect to the ownership of safety equipment, torch ranked top with 5,829 torches reported, followed with 1,869 first aid kits and 1,100 lanterns. On average there is 1.2 television screens (TV) to every household in the Cook Islands, this means that there are some households with more than TV. This is more apparent in the Rarotonga households. About 80 per cent of all households own DVD players and 74.6 per cent own computers or laptops. Cameras IPads are also on the rise.

The number of freezers, fridge/freezers, dishwasher and washing machine increased since 2011. In 2016 3,662 (82.6 per cent) of the households had a freezer, up by 792 (21.6 per cent) on the 2011 census. 3,000 households had a fridge/freezer with 2,336 in Rarotonga. 240 households had a dishwasher compared to 174 reported in 2011 with the majority reported in Rarotonga. Ownership of washing machines over the census period slightly increased by 9 per cent with 2,661 (74.5 per cent) reported in Rarotonga. Other selected appliances owned by households such as refrigerators, clothes dryer, air conditioner demonstrated an increase over the census period.

7.8 Waste Management

In 2016 census only 7.6 per cent (337) of the households do not use the local authorities rubbish collection system, the rubbish were burnt, recycled or re-used or used for composting. Over 60 per cent (2,878) reported to only part of their rubbish being collected and 27.5 per cent (1,220) had all their rubbish collected.

7.9 Agriculture Activity

The 2016 census included a question on how households are utilizing the land and whether they were engaged in agriculture and fishing activities, and if yes, whether it was mainly for home consumption, for sale or for community obligation.

About 24.4 per cent of all households in the Cook Islands operated land for agriculture purposes. 49.0 per cent grow fruit and tree crops, 43.7 per cent flowers, 35.6 per cent grow vegetables and 55 per cent collects coconut. This is the same pattern that exist throughout the rest of the country. Most crops that were grown were bananas, taro, maniota, pawpaw, lemon and lime.

The main farm equipment owned by households in 2016 was the same as those reported in 2011 that included grass cutter (3,050), motor mower (2,281), water pump (1,369), and chainsaw (1,707) and knap sack (1,290).

7.10 Fishing Activity

The 2016 census has limited questions on fishing activity to where fishing was mostly located, and to owning fishing equipment. The ownership of fishing equipment in itself does not imply fishing activity since a dwelling may not be engaged in fishing but may own some form of equipment. The main fishing equipment owned by households in the Cook Islands included 2,855 imported fishing rods, 1,597 fishing nets and 1,367 spear guns. 593 fishing boats and 320 fishing canoes were reported in 2011 and this is more common in the outer islands. Location of fishing activity was dominant inside reef or lagoon while 710 households reported to fishing both in and outside reef or lagoon. Pearl farming continued to be practiced in the Northern Group islands.

7.11 Transport

Motor cycle is a popular mode of transport in the Cook Islands particularly on Rarotonga and is growing gradually. The 2016 Census reported 6,857 motor cycles compared to 6,186 in 2011 an increase of 10.8 per cent with 67 per cent of vehicles on Rarotonga. The next common type of vehicle was Motor Cars with a total of 2,351, 89 per cent on Rarotonga. The types of vehicles reported for the outer islands were mainly motorcycles and bicycles.
