YELLOWFIN TUNA LANDINGS IN AMERICAN SAMOA, 1976-1992

This report describes landings of yellowfin tuna in American Samoa, including (1) commercial landings of distant-water yellowfin for processing at canneries, and (2) artisanal and recreational catches within American Samoa's EEZ.




FIGURE 1. Yellowfin tuna landings in American Samoa.

Yellowfin tuna account for 23% of all fish landed at American Samoa's canneries. The first deliveries of yellowfin tuna by US purse seiners were made in 1976 (Fig. 1). In recent years (1988-1992), yellowfin landings have ranged 20,000-45,000 mt (Table 1). Most of this was caught by US purse seiners (93%), the remainder was bycatch from US trollers and foreign longliners.




FIGURE 2. Artisanal catch of yellowfin tuna in American Samoa.




FIGURE 3. Yellowfin tuna CPUE in artisanal fishery in American Samoa.

In the artisanal fishery, yellowfin account for 18-32% of the total pelagic harvest. Catches of yellowfin in coastal waters have averaged 17 mt/y over the past decade (Fig. 2), and CPUE has been fairly stable (Fig. 3).




FIGURE 4. Largest and average sizes of yellowfin tuna caught in tournaments in American Samoa.

In sportfish tournaments, yellowfin catches average 1.3 mt/y and account for 35% of the harvest. Average and maximum weights of sport-caught yellowfin are 25.5 lb (11.6 kg) and 185 lb (84.1 kg) (Fig. 4).
